**A Dangerous Counterfeit.** Mr. Silas Fulcher has detected a dangerous counterfeit silver dollar that was passed on him by some one on Friday last. He has left it at the JOURNAL office for inspection. It is almost an exact counterpart of the standard silver dollar and separate from the genuine it is difficult to detect it. A close inspection and comparison will, however, show the difference. The most striking variance is in the border, which is considerably wider than the genuine. There are other discrepancies which a close inspection will reveal.

**EDITOR JOURNAL**—Dear Sir—I saw in the Jones county items that one of our farmers thinks the law in regard to shooting partridges ought to be repealed. I agree with what he says, for they are doing my crop more damage than the crow, and I think the farmer ought to have the right to kill any bird that is doing him harm.

**W. G. FORDHAM, JR.** If Mr. Fordham will examine chapter 204 of the laws of 1883 he will find that the law in regard to shooting partridges does not apply to the counties of Johnston, Tyrrell, Dare, Onslow, Carteret, Jones and Columbus.

### THE JEWELS.

That was an interesting session of the Jewels which took place at the front door of the Cotton Exchange on Friday afternoon.

The Panel was not as full as on some former occasions, but yet a good flow of spirits or a flow of good spirits took the place of numbers and was an important feature of the sitting. It might be styled, for want of a better name, a politico-social session.

Discussion opened upon the Constitution of the United States. The rights and powers of the States under the compact and the powers of the National Government over the sovereign States, were considered—the right or wrong of secession receiving a passing notice. From this an avenue opened up to a discussion upon the men of that day. The social habits of the Father of his Country receiving rather more attention than his patriotism of which so much has been already said.

General Andrew Jackson was not overlooked, although his private life was looked over pretty carefully from Salisbury to New Orleans, and from there to the White House, and at the Hermitage. The discussion was well spiced with anecdotes and some of them well preserved as all timber is susceptible of being when of the choicest quality.

The Panel was in fine humor, hilarious to a noticeable degree and of the most agreeable temper in the discussion of the afternoon. Nothing occurred to mar the enjoyment of the session, and only one mention was made of the events of the present day, and that was the modest announcement of a member that he would like mightily to vote for Gilmer for Governor. There being no objection he may do so.

From the grave subject of government the Panel slid off into a yarn spinning adventure, at which pert, impert and experts took a hand.

All went jocular as a marriage bell until one of the experts introduced the story of a steamboat explosion in distant waters in which he was just beyond the reach of one of the boilers that came plunging on deck, and nearly wrapped in flames that were licking their blazing tongues after a cargo of six tons of gunpowder which seemed so intensely perilous that an immediate adjournment took place even before he could reach the finale of his story and tell how he found his vest with eight hundred dollars in the pocket or tell how it was that he knew it occurred at twenty-one minutes past 3 o'clock on the morning of the ninth of October, 1853.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—General Sheridan is undoubtedly a very sick man, and has been very near death's door, and is even now in a critical condition. WASHINGTON, May 25.—The Senate spent several hours again today in secret session, ostensibly discussing the motion of Senator Sherman to proceed to the consideration of the fisheries treaty with open doors but in reality debating the merits of the treaty itself. Senator Morgan was the principal speaker. The afternoon session is reported to have been remarkably dull as a general thing, but it is said that a colloquy between Edmunds and Morgan in regard to the treaty the President is likely to do if the Senate does not ratify the treaty would be read with interest if made public. No action was taken and the treaty, though under discussion, has not yet been formally taken up.
