The circuit court of the United States for the district of North Carolina convened pursuant to adjournment, in this city on Wednesday evening, Judge Seymour presiding.

The case of The Citizens National Bank of Raleigh vs. Receiver Dowd of the State National Bank was taken up. The question at issue was whether or not the depositors or creditors of the State National Bank, who made deposits on the eve of the failure of the bank, were entitled to priority over other creditors. The case was argued by F. H. Busbee, Esq., for Receiver Dowd, and R. H. Battle, Esq., for the Citizens National Bank and other creditors.

In a similar case, the difference being that the original packages of money were recognized. His Honor held the papers for examination.
