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Quarantine Matters. GOLDSBORO, August 25th, 1888. EDITOR JOURNAL:—The appearance in your valuable paper of today of an article under the caption of "Quarantine Matters," makes it obligatory upon me as Superintendent of Public Health of Wayne, to answer the unfounded and unjust accusation of indifference and neglect on the part of the legally constituted authority of our city to promptly establish the necessary quarantine regulation, not only to protect our own community from an epidemic of the terrible scourge of yellow fever, but by such criminal delay to jeopardize our sister cities with whom we were in daily communication. Mr. Editor, we are well aware of the cause of this great apprehension and alarm of your citizens, by remembering the visitation of the scourge in 1854, and hold the same in mitigation of your hasty and timorous course now. But with our knowledge of the causation, nature and distinctive characteristics of yellow fever, and with the consensus of medical opinion as to its non-communicability by personal contact when removed from an infected district, and that the specific germs could not be multiplied or generated in an isolated case, and with all due deference and high appreciation of the reputation, bearing and skill of my professional confrere in the Athens of North Carolina, the Board of Health did not deem it wise to necessarily herald the advent of a disease which had wandered from its habitat and fallen into a salubrious climate where none of the essential elements existed whereby it could possibly become an epidemic, and hence after the cordon of quarantine had been established around the only case (and that of the mildest type) one mile distant from the city limits, the Board of Health issued a statement setting forth the facts relative to the Florida refugee and the disease with which he was afflicted.

In the article above referred to it is asserted that your port physician endeavored to obtain information relative to this case of yellow fever, and that he was refused the courtesy of an answer. The facts are these: Your port physician sent me a telegram on the 15th inst., requesting the symptoms, etc., of the Florida patient. The telegram was answered promptly, and a letter giving in detail all the particulars was contemplated in writing in a day or so, but an official communication rendered unnecessary, as it embraced all the information sought except the syllabus of per wire with reference to the same.
