**Proceedings** of Board of Commissioners of Craven County at the Regular Meeting held 1st Monday in September, 1888.

**The board convened** at 11 o'clock. Present: W. G. Brinson, Samuel W. Latham, Thos. H. Mallison and Wm. M. Watson.

**On motion** Commissioner Watson was elected chairman pro tem.

**Commissioner Latham** was allowed further time to examine the records relative to laying out public roads.

**The registration books** of James City precinct, No. 7 township, having been misplaced, it was ordered by the board that there be a new registration of voters for that precinct and the clerk instructed to make the necessary publication required by law.

**A new voting precinct** in No. 9 township to be known as Arnold's Store was established and the clerk ordered to make the necessary publication of the fact and of a new registration in No. 9 township.

**Mrs. Elizabeth Wood** of No. 3 township was allowed \$3.00 per month in rations, to be issued by Commissioner Watson, until further ordered by the board.

**A bridge** was ordered built across Mauls swamp in No. 1 township where the public road crosses said swamp, the bridge not to cost the county exceeding fifty dollars.

**Due notice** having been given and no objection being filed, it was ordered that the sheriff summon a jury to lay out the public road in No. 3 township described in the petition of Addison P. Whitford and others filed at the August meeting, provided that all costs and charges attending the laying out of said road shall be borne by the petitioners and not by the county.

**The voucher** issued to Sina Dunn for her support was ordered to be issued to J. L. Toler.

**Catherine Jane Smithwick** was placed upon the pauper list with a monthly allowance of \$1.00, payable to R. G. Mosley.

**Commissioner Brinson** reported that since the last meeting of the board he had been compelled to have the draw in Clermont bridge repaired.

**Julia Mackey** was placed upon the pauper list with a monthly allowance of \$1.00 until further ordered.

**Thos. Bowden** and W. M. Asher were granted license to retail liquors at Blue store on Middle street for one year upon paying the license required by law.

**The clerk** was instructed to notify the sheriff that the board will be prepared to examine and audit his accounts on tomorrow at 11 o'clock a. m.

**The application** of Nelson Jones for relief was referred to Commissioner Watson with power to act.

**Commissioner Watson** submitted a report in regard to the poor house farm which was approved and adopted.

**The clerk** was ordered to advertise the poor house farm in the New Berne Journal and offer it to the highest bidder at the court house door on Saturday, September 8th at 11 a. m. for the year 1888.

**E. E. Quidly**, junior of court house, was allowed leave of absence for thirty days upon employing some competent person to fill his place.

**Board adjourned** to Tuesday 10 o'clock.

## STATE NEWS CONDENSED.

**Charlotte Democrat:** Our neighbor the Chronicle a few days ago suggested that we needed a market house for the city. No such thing is needed, unless it is for sleeping places for idle negroes during the day and night. Respectable business men have regular places to sell meats and vegetables and do not need exposures in a market house. It was once tried in Charlotte and found to be a great nuisance.

**Winston Republican:** Mr. J. O. Foy, editor of the Twin City Daily, was quite painfully injured at Brassfield, last Thursday afternoon, by jumping from a moving train. The Durham Plant puts it that Mr. Foy left the city on the excursion train with the intention of taking the west-bound train at the meeting point. His injuries were caused by jumping from the excursion train before it had stopped. He returned to Winston that night and while considerably bruised by the accident was not deterred from immediate duty upon his paper.

**Henderson Gold Leaf:** Hon. F. M. Simmons, member of Congress for this district, is one of the most active and industrious representatives in the National Capitol, and ever alive to the best interests of his constituents. He has just introduced a bill in the interest of the Southern cotton planter, which in view of the great "bagging trust," fostered by a protective tariff, ought to become a law. It is to put cotton bagging on the free list as long as the price of the article is subject to the manipulation of the trust companies. It is understood that a member of the Ways and Means Committee to which this bill was referred told Mr. Simmons he regarded it favorably.

**Norfolk Virginian:** Hon. L. C. Latham, M. C. from the First North Carolina district, passed through this city yesterday on his way to Washington. We learn from Camden that Mr. Latham was invited by the Executive Committee and Young Men's Democratic Association of that county to address the people and that he did so in a masterly speech. He not only sustained and justified the Cleveland administration and the demand of the party for revenue reform, but advocated the election of Col. Tom Skinner as his successor in Congress. The effort of Mr. Latham was magical—he thoroughly aroused the gallant Democrats of Camden and the result of the election will show that they are a unit for Cleveland, Thurman and Skinner.
