## HEBREW NEW YEAR.

Last Wednesday at sunset commenced a new year with the Hebrews. All Hebrews keep holy that day, which is called **Rosh Hashanah**. While the advanced synagogues keep only that one day, the orthodox synagogues observe two days—Thursday and Friday.

Saturday, the 8th inst., will be an important Sabbath, and is called the "Sabbath of Repentance." On the following day, Sunday, the stricter Israelites keep the fast of **Gedaliah** from sunrise to sunset.

Friday evening, the 14th inst., will be the eve of the great Day of Atonement, called **Yom Kippurim**. The day is strictly observed with fasting from sunset until Saturday's sunset.

On Wednesday, the 19th inst., festival of **Booths**, or **Sucoth**, commences, lasting seven days, but the advanced synagogues observe only the 29th and the closing festival, on September 27. The orthodox synagogues observe September 20, 21, 27 and 28.

The 26th day of September is called **Hoshanah Rabbah**, the feast of the **Willow**. On the Sabbath of the 29th commences the new cycle of the reading of the Pentateuch, and the difference between the orthodox and the advanced Israelites is also shown in the fact that while the five books of Moses are read by orthodox congregations during the period of one year, the advanced congregations read only one-third a year, or the entire Pentateuch in a cycle of three years.

The year 5649 will be a leap year, the synagogues will observe thirteen months instead of twelve, and the New Year of 5650 will commence on Monday, September 26, 1889.

**Steamer Movements.**

The **Eagle** of the E. C. D. line arrived yesterday with a full cargo of general merchandise and will sail this afternoon at 4 o'clock. The **Vesper** of this line will arrive tomorrow.

The **Manteo** of the O. D. line sails this morning at nine o'clock for **Norfolk**.

**Yellow Fever.**

**JACKSONVILLE**, September 5.—New cases reported for 18 hours ending noon today, 21; deaths 4.

The **Citizens' Association** this morning resolved to accept outside aid tendered for relief which the government cannot render. Government funds are furnished only for specific purposes. An appeal will be sent to the Press tonight.

It was understood that **Surgeon-General Hamilton** at yesterday's conference that the government will pay for certain sanitary work, but not for nurses, provisions and physicians for the sick who are unable to pay these charges themselves; and for this and for the general relief of the thousands now out of employment, and who cannot be accommodated in adequate camps of refuge, it was decided this morning by the executive committee of the **Citizens' Association**, in conference with the board of health and the acting Mayor, to issue the following appeal:

To our friends and fellow-citizens of the United States:—We, the authorized representatives of the citizens of Jacksonville, recognizing the fact that the epidemic has now reached such a stage that our own funds are insufficient either to cope with the many cases of absolute necessity, for the engagement of nurses or for numerous other demands upon us; and whereas, owing to the absence of all business many of the most liberal citizens are unable to furnish further funds, we now think we are justified in accepting the many willing offers received from you. We therefore wish our fellow-citizens of the United States to know that we will gratefully receive the aid they have offered, and that any contributions will be used for the benefit of those in need, and where they will effect the greatest good. We request that any such contributions may be forwarded to **James M. Schumacher**, President of the First National Bank and Chairman of our Finance Committee.

"Signed, **Neal Mitchell**, President of the **Davall County Board of Health**; **D. T. Gerow**, Acting Mayor; **F. McQuade**, Acting President of the **Citizens' Auxiliary Association**, Jacksonville, Fla."

Our citizens have expended many thousands of dollars of their own means, but now they recognize the fact that owing to business being practically dead, they will be no longer able to relieve the sick and needy.

**WASHINGTON**, Sept. 5.—A telegram has been received at the **Marine Hospital**, **Barron**, from **Dr. Wall**, at **Tampa**, saying that there have been seven new cases reported there within the past two days, four of which are positive. Most of the cases, he says, are of a mild type. **Dr. Murray** reports by telegram that he has arrived from **Tampa**, and that there is one isolated case at **Manatee**, and another at **Palmetto**, and that other river villages are healthy.

## STATE NEWS CONDENSED.

**Windsor Ledger:** We understand that **Senator Ransom** has obtained a position for **Mr. J. T. Waldo**, of **Hamilton**, **Martin** county, with a salary of \$2,000 a year.

**Raleigh Recorder:** **Rev. H. W. Battle** of **New Berne** called to see us on Friday last. He attended the **Central Association** and preached a capital sermon for the brethren at **Wake Forest** on Thursday night.

**Asheville Citizen:** Owing to the recent heavy rains, rendering the mountain roads almost impassable in the West, **Col. Waddell**, elector for the State-at-large, has been compelled to cancel all engagements made for him by the executive committee in the counties of **Graham**, **Cherokee**, **Clay** and **Macon**.

**Elizabeth City Economist:** The past week our farmers have been engaged in pulling fodder, and a large quantity has been saved, the weather being all that could be asked.—Reports from all parts of the State are that the prospects of a good cotton crop is very favorable. The crop in this section was never better.

**Raleigh Advance:** In a private note to **Rev. W. J. W. Crowder**, **Rev. T. W. Moore**, D. D., of **Florida**, says: As to yellow fever it is not half so dreadful in Florida as is reported abroad. The disease is a scourge of the drinkers of all alcoholic drinks. Of the eight who have died in Jacksonville all were regular drinkers except one lady who was an invalid and in feeble health when attacked.

**Charlotte Chronicle:** **Rev. P. R. Law**, who had filled the position of editorial writer upon the Chronicle for some months past, retired from the editorial chair last Saturday. **Mr. W. S. Hemby**, late proprietor of the Chronicle, left this morning for **Washington City**, **Baltimore**, **Philadelphia** and **New York**. He will return and make a trip to **Eastern North Carolina** before his departure to **St. Louis**.

**News and Observer:** There was the heaviest fall of rain at **Greensboro** on Monday known in many years. Two and nine-tenths inches of rain fell.—The good old town of **Carthage**, **Moore** county, now has telegraphic as well as railroad communication with the outside world, a telegraphic line from **Cameron**, a station on the **Raleigh and Augusta Air Line**, to **Carthage**, having been opened for business yesterday. The **Carthage** railroad, from **Cameron** to **Carthage**, was opened for business on August 13th last. This road is operated as a branch of the **Raleigh and Augusta Air Line**, and gives **Carthage** direct communication with all points via the **Seaboard Air Line** system of railroad and steamer lines. Thus has the **Seaboard Air Line** constructed another branch, thereby adding to the material interests of **North Carolina**, as well as to the people along the line.

**Statesville Landmark:** A telegram from **Congressman Henderson** Monday evening brought the gratifying information that the committee on appropriations had inserted in the sundry civil bill \$75,000 for the **Statesville** public building. That makes it safe.—**Mr. I. T. Roberts** has found gold in large quantities on his farm near **Oakbrun** in **Wilkes** county. Specimens of the gold have been sent to **New York**, and **Mr. Roberts** has received an offer of \$11,000 for his property.—Some time since **Robert Sears**, of **East Bend** township, **Yadkin** county, went out west to visit his two sons who had been living there several years, and, as they allege, promised them that if they would come back he would convey all his property to them. They came, accordingly, about three weeks ago, but the old man had by this time changed his mind and concluded not to deed his property away. The sons got mad and got on a bum and on the night of the 17th burned two tenant houses on the place and two tobacco barns and then skipped out. The neighbors turned out in squads to hunt them, but at last accounts they had not been found. They have probably gone West again to grow up with the country.

**FOREIGN NEWS.**

**LONDON**, Sept. 4.—**Mr. Gladstone** went to **Wrexham** last night to address a meeting of **Liberals**. After **Mr. Gladstone** had begun to speak he found that his audience was not altogether a friendly one. When one portion of the gathering cheered him another portion hissed. This led to an uproar, and for some time the greatest confusion reigned. **Gladstone** stopped speaking, and was not able to resume for fully five minutes. The trouble was due more to local jealousies than to opposition to **Gladstone**.

**DUBLIN**, Sept. 4.—It having been rumored that a meeting would be held at **Mitchellstown** on Sunday next, on the occasion of the anniversary of the **Mitchellstown** riot, the police have received orders to prohibit the gathering.

**ROME**, Sept. 4.—The Pope, assisted by **Abbot Passi** as editor, is writing a history of **Rome** in the middle ages. Particular attention will be paid to the period of the **Great Gregory**.
