Insolvent Tax-Payers of Craven Co. EDITOR JOURNAL -In the proceedings of the last meeting of the board of county commissioners, recently published in your paper. I see where the board made an allowance to the sheriff in his settlement for a list of insolvent polls and personal property taxes. A the law requires the sheriff to forth with publish said list of insolvents at the const house door, and at least one public place in each township, a list of such delinquents of said township, under a beavy penalty, it is to be expect ed that this part of the law will be complied with at an early day, so that the public may know who these non-tax payers are. The law further requires cloud of gloom, sorrow, suffering and the board of commissioners in their discretion to publish said list of intol vents in a newspaper at the expense of the county, which law has been in force for many years past. Now as this has not been complied with by the board nor by the sheriff in the past, we trust that this matter will not be omit ted in the future. The public ought to see their names in public print and learn who these drones are. The poll tax is a sacred tax, devoted entirely to education and support of the poor, and no man should fail or refuse to pay it

According to the constitution, no per-son between 21 and 50 years of age can be excused from the payment of this tax except in cases of poverty and infirmity, Newbern, Sept. 14, 1888.
