**A BILL** has been introduced in Congress to reduce letter postage to one cent an ounce.

**THE Senate** has passed a bill granting a pension of \$3,500 to the widow of General Sheridan.

**VOLUNTARY contributions** to the funds of the Democratic Campaign Committee are flowing in at a lively rate.

**WINTER** has taken an early start. Frost in nearly all the States, and snow in Virginia, New York, New Hampshire, Vermont and Michigan, and throughout England.

**MR. MORTON**, the Republican candidate for Vice-President, has given to the public his letter of acceptance. It contains nothing new, but keeps harping on the tariff.

**It is now said** that the County Democracy and Tammany are again at peace, and Mayor Hewitt will be renominated for Mayor of New York tonight at a meeting in Cooper Union.

**BUSINESS** going to pieces, did you say? See here. All of the window glass factories in the Western Association, twenty-nine in all, resumed operations last Monday after a six weeks shut down. Thirteen hundred men were offered work in Pittsburg alone.

**THE very complete summary** of election betting reports from all parts of the country published in the New York Times, shows a decided preference for the Democratic candidates. The latest wagers are five to four on Cleveland, but in many cases larger odds are given on our nominee.

**THE present** is the longest continuous session of Congress ever held in Washington. The longest

preceding session was that of 1850, which ended Sept. 30th, but no man can tell when the present session will end. If our statesmen were working and being paid by the day it might be considered a Congress for revenue only. But as the pay of members is not materially affected by the length of their sittings it is adjudged to be a Congress for buncombe.

**THERE** is no stronger argument in favor of the Democratic policy of tariff reduction than that afforded by the history of the war taxation. One by one Republican Congresses relieved corporations and rich men of the burdens imposed upon them. Railroads, banking business, and large incomes were successively exempted from the war tax. But the proposition to lessen the burdens that fall upon all the people has aroused the most virulent opposition from the Republican party. The Senatorial tariff bill, faithful to Republican policy, seeks to lighten the load upon luxuries and monopolies, but gives nothing of relief, comfort or encouragement to the masses."

There was an error in the proceedings of the city council, published yesterday morning. The Hook and Ladder Company, through Mr. Manix, applied to the council to procure a house for them, and not to purchase a house as printed.

The Grand Lodge of Good Samaritans have been in session in this city during the week. They paraded the streets yesterday evening with a band of music in the lead. The handsome regalia which they wear on such occasions makes the parade one of the interesting events of their coming together.

Cheatham was in the city on Wednesday night while Mr. Cook of Warren was trying to persuade men. But few of his followers knew that he was here. It is said that the burden of his song now is that all who do not vote for him are Democrats. We think he has been denounced by Republicans in Vance county for yoting a Democratic ticket, yet he is the Republican nominee. So to vote a Democratic ticket seems to make a Republican more prominent with his party.

C. A. Cook, Esq., of Warren, addressed a good crowd at Five Points on Wednesday night. He labored hard to show how great a sin it was to vote for any other than the regular nominee of the party. Mr. Cook is doubtless honest in his opinion about that, but the truth of it is, the people of Craven county don't want Mr. Cook's advice on that point. They are bent on voting in the interest of their county; they are determined to lift it out of the slough of political despondency and place it along with the other progressive counties of the State.

**Need Have no Fears.**  
The proprietors of Hotel Albert have received a letter from the party of Massachusetts gentlemen stating that they thought of abandoning their proposed visit to New Berne owing to the prevalence of yellow fever in portions of the South. We would inform the gentlemen that they need have no fears whatever of fever in this section. Our health rate was never better and as we have already had frost it is almost impossible for fever to be brought here. A number of Northern visitors were here last winter, and with the splendid accommodation that Hotel Albert can now offer, it is expected many more will be here this winter.

**Attempt at Burglary.**  
Last night upon the return of the family of Mr. E. K. Bryan from prayer meeting it was found that some one had entered the house in their absence. Before leaving, the doors and windows were left securely fastened, and upon their return the window opening on the back porch was found raised and the back door unlocked—all of the curtains both upstairs and downstairs were pulled down and a lamp was found in the bedroom of Mrs. Bryan lighted and sitting upon the rug on the floor. It was evident that the burglar was a careful party, and was surprised before commencing operations, as the family were only away from the house about thirty five minutes.

**The Underground River.**  
News has been received here that a great sensation prevails at Whiteville, Columbus county, the seat of what is claimed as the underground river. The roaring and rushing of the water can be plainly heard, and hundreds of people are visiting the spot. When in the vicinity of the supposed stream it can be plainly heard, but when a person lies flat upon the ground the phenomenon becomes really alarming. The sound indicates that the water is not in great distance down, and that it is not in small streams, but a majestic river that is coursing on its way unseen in the bowels of the earth to the sea. Vehicles passing over the ground where the phenomenon exists create hollow echoes from below, and the earth in the vicinity for a great distance around seems to be cavernous, judging from the sounds that follow sharp blows. The Whiteville people are possessed of a very morbid curiosity about the matter. Some say there is no telling when the bottom may fall out of the whole town.—Greensboro Patriot.

## THE YELLOW FEVER.

**JACKSONVILLE, Fla., October 3**—At a meeting of an executive committee to day, Bishop West of the Relief Committee, reported that the number of ration tickets was being rapidly decreased, and all abuses ferreted out and corrected as fast as consistent with maintaining the good work of his department. The Finance Committee reported the receipt of \$1,395 today. Dr. J. Y. Porter received a despatch this morning from Dr. Tate Powell of Starke, Florida, stating that an expert was needed at Temple Mills Station on the Florida railroad, and navigation line near Starke to examine the condition of 8 Temple, proprietor of the mills, as it was believed he had yellow fever.

Edwin Martin of the Times Union, left his office tonight at 6 o'clock and went home sick. He has no symptoms of fever, but is suffering from prostration consequent upon the constant strain of managing his newspaper for the past two months under almost unaccountable difficulties. It is hoped that perfect quiet for a few days will restore him to health.

**JACKSONVILLE, October 3**—The situation today presents no new features, the subject uppermost in the public mind being the death of Col. J. J. Daniel. He had been a resident of Jacksonville since 1874, and a citizen of the State was more highly esteemed for ability, integrity, public spirit and moral worth. He was a member of the law firm of Fleming & Daniel, being joint attorneys of Florida, one of the junior members of the firm being Frank P. Fleming, being the Democratic candidate for Governor. The Auxiliary Association, of which Col. Daniel was president met today and passed suitable resolutions on his death and adjourned without transacting any other business. The banks have been closed during the day, many buildings were draped in mourning, and business generally suspended. Any bright features which the gloom and grief consequent upon the death of this large hearted man.

Dr. Neal Mitchell, President of the Board of Health, issued the following official bulletin for the twenty-four hours ending at 6 p.m. yesterday: New cases, 73, deaths, 2. Total cases to date, 2,846 total deaths, 270. Of the new cases 72 are white and 1 colored; a nearer approach to equality than for many weeks past.

There is a movement on foot to raise a fund for the erection of a monument to the memory of Col. J. J. Daniel. The Times Union will tomorrow give its strongest possible endorsement editorially, and make an appeal to the friends of the dead philanthropist in whatever part of the country they may chance to be. There can be no doubt of the success of this movement, and it is confidently expected that many thousands of dollars will be raised. Strange to say, Jacksonville has not one monument within its confines. It has never even raised a shaft to its Confederate dead, and it is now regarded as eminently fitting that the first monument of this kind should be raised to one whose life was so closely identified with the welfare of the city and of the State of Florida.

The proprietor of the Fountain Hotel went home from meeting the other night and ordered his bar keeper to close up for good.

**Raleigh News and Observer.** The pine straw bagging has been tried in the Raleigh compass and has been found to stand the test perfectly.—At Millburns Tuesday the Republicans refused to divide time with the Democratic speakers. The county Democratic candidates were all on the ground but did not speak.—Hon. G. W. Sanderlin, the eloquent and witty speaker of the campaign, and Col. A. M. Waddell, the brilliant and ornate orator, will address the Raleigh people on next Friday night.—A large number of ladies and gentlemen assembled in the Supreme Court chamber Tuesday morning to witness the presentation of the splendid portrait of Chief Justice Frederick Nash. The portrait, which was donated by the Supreme Court by the descendants of the late Chief Justice, is a splendid likeness and a superb specimen of art. It was presented to an ornate talk by Mr. F. H. Busbee.

Sec. 2. That said sum be placed at the disposal of the streets and pumps committee, to be expended in such manner as will best carry out the purpose hereof.
