Manufacturing.
New Berne is much more of a manufacturing town than many of its own people are aware of. Who would believe, without stopping to count them, that there are about forty manufacturing in and around New Berne employing about five hundred hands? But few would believe it, yet such is the fact.

But there is room for more and there is good opportunity for doubling and trebling the capacity of many of the establishments already in operation. The furniture factory, for instance, is one of our infant industries and ought to receive the encouragement of every citizen. Why don't some of our moneyed men come to its assistance with their capital and help them to put in machinery and employ a large number of laborers? We must rely upon such industries to stimulate the growth and commercial importance of the city. Men who own large property in the city and have money to invest should remember, when they are casting about for investment, that nothing will enhance the value of their property more than the building up of manufacturing industries.

THE YELLOW FEVER.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Surgeon Ross has telegraphed to Surgeon General Hamilton, from Fernandina as follows: "Much more sickness here, principally among negroes, than is thought or reported. The Howard Association has no more means than necessary for the care of the sick and needy. The number of letters are large and increasing. Many infected houses and much infected bedding are here which should be fumigated, disinfected, and some destroyed. Will you furnish means for fumigation, infection and compensation for articles destroyed thereby greatly diminishing the danger of trouble in the future, especially next year.

DECATUR, October 6.—Three new cases since last report.

JACKSONVILLE, October 6.—The official bulletin gives new cases 81; deaths 5. Total cases, 3,108; total deaths 382. Of the new cases 39 are white and 43 colored.
