We assume that you are an honest man; that you intend to have fair play in your precinct on election day; that you intend to frown down upon and prevent fraud. We assume this, because we believe you to be a man of good common sense.

We don't know which party will carry North Carolina. We do know one thing—that there will be a fair count, or that every man who perpetrates or winks at fraud will see the inside of the Federal Penitentiary at Albany within six months. We say six months, for Mr. Cleveland's term will expire on March 4th, and General Harrison is certain to be President after that date, and his first act will be the appointment of a Republican U. S. District Attorney and a Republican U. S. Marshal for North Carolina.

Don't you believe this? Don't you know that Mr. Cleveland hasn't a ghost of a show of being re-elected? Don't you know that New York will give General Harrison 40,000 majority? ### THE YELLOW FEVER.

**JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 31.**—President Neal Mitchell reports 29 new cases of yellow fever today—19 whites. Among the latter is Peyton Wythe, a well known insurance broker. Only 1 death—Dora Dobson, Texas cases 1156 deaths, 334.

No new cases and no deaths at Gainesville.  
**FERNANDINA, Oct. 30.**—New cases 18 white, 1 no deaths. All cases under treatment are doing well. The fever still continues to increase outside the city. Three vessels have come up to the city.

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.**—Surgeon-General Hamilton has received a telegram from Surgeon Martin, at Live Oak, Fla., saying that he made a post mortem examination on the body of a man who died there Sunday last, and is satisfied that it was a case of yellow fever. He adds that there are now two suspicious cases of sickness in the city.

**CHICAGO, Nov. 1.**—Mayor Rice received the following telegram this morning: "Enterprise, Fla.—Mayor Rice: Chicago—Twenty-two cases and four deaths from yellow fever to date. Five hundred people in distress. Am compelled to ask for aid. Can Chicago help us?"

**"GEORGE I. CARLISLE,"** "Society Board Health."  
**DECATUR, Ala., November 1.**—In the last twenty-four hours eight new cases have developed. They have all been exposed as nurses and policeman for weeks. I have expected new cases from time to time but was not prepared for such an explosion as this.

**JEROME COCHRAN, M. D.,** State Health Officer.  
**JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 1.**—Today was the coolest for a week past, but the fever took another jump despite it. One year ago yesterday the mercury went down to 40. Today it reached the lowest point, nearly 20 degrees above that. The season appears unusually warm compared with other years, but the impatience for frost has much to do with this no doubt. There is still a long drag of nearly six weeks ahead before the city will be in condition at all approaching normal. Many people are getting tired out and leaving for recuperation until the embargo on refugees shall be withdrawn.

Dr. Porter today announced to the Executive Committee that government guards will be placed at all junctions and transfer points on railroads leading to Jacksonville, at Baldwin, Live Oak, Waycross, Jessup, etc., and that detectives will be employed to spot any refugees intending to reach the city under false pretences. Railroad companies have agreed not to sell tickets to Jacksonville for the present. As no one can foretell the end of the epidemic the prospect is not a little discouraging.

Dr. Neal Mitchell reports 56 new cases today—16 whites—and 3 deaths. Total cases, 4,312; total deaths, 356.
