ELECTION NEWS.

RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 8.-Harrison's election is now regarded as certain. Republicans get a majority of from twelve to fifteen in the National House of Representatives. Fowle's majority is over twenty thousand, it appears. The Democrats have a large majority in the Legislature. One Democrat elected to the House in Wake. The board of canvassers here may throw out one ward by reason of irregularities and this will make the county Democratic and safe as to Sheriff Johnston is certainly defeated for Congress in the 9th district. There is no news as to Simmons. Skinner is elected. Morehead defeated.

PAMLICO COUNTY.

FOSCU EJECTED IN JONES.
TRENTON, Nov. 8.-The Board of Canvassers of Jones county met at the court house today and after a full investigation came to the conclusion to throw out the returns of Beaver Creek township for moving the boxes and other irregularities which elects E. M. Foscu to the Legislature.

BEAUFORT COUNTY.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.-Fowle's majority in this county is two hundred and ninety-three. Skinner is elected to Congress by a majority of fifteen hundred.

ONSLOW.
Gilman, Democrat, is elected to the Legislature by about 900 majority. Brock, Democrat, defeats Whitford, Independent, for the Senate by the same vote.

HYDE COUNTY.
Makely, Democrat, is elected to the Legislature by a good majority and the entire Democratic county ticket except Register of Deeds is elected.
