Railroad Wrecks. CINCINNATI, Nov. 20.—The Harrison accommodation of the Cincinnati, Indianapolis, St. Louis and Chicago Road, due at 7:18 a. m. in this city, left the track by reason of an approaching rail about two miles this side of Harrison and overturned five coaches. One coach had fire in it, and from this the wreck caught fire, but it was soon extinguished. About forty passengers were injured, nearly all of whom were more or less hurt seriously, and one killed fatally.

On the Pacific. A coastwise wreck occurred on the Union Pacific Railroad at Rock Creek station yesterday afternoon. A west-bound freight train No. 23, pulled by two engines, an engine and a train were fatally injured and ten or twelve passengers of the west-bound train were injured.

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Cotton Damaged by Fire. CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 20.—About five hundred and fifty bales of cotton on the Elphinstone, immediately under the fore-castle, were damaged by fire and water, and there was some damage to cotton between decks. The after hold is supposed to be all right.
