THE NEW ADMINISTRATION AND THE SOUTHERN STATES.

This is the caption of a leader in Harper's Weekly in which it says, "There is a constant reference in the press of the Southern States to 'our people,' 'the Southern people,' 'the South,' which in its degree is alike the practice of any other part of the country..."

So far as the JOURNAL is concerned, we plead guilty to the charge, but deny the conclusion.

This is the South, the people of the South are our people, and when, for any cause, we refuse to vindicate her honor and defend their rights...

We have a right to cherish the South, for her history is without a parallel.

In the Revolution she won the right to special recognition. Favorites of the mother country, the Southern colonies could have been secure under the protecting aegis of the British flag...

In 1812, when again the United States and England were involved in war, the South had no material interest in the contest.

When the clouds again covered our skies and Mexico became the theatre of war, the North and the South fought under a common flag...

The war between the States was not of our seeking; and when the conflict was over, the South assumed her accustomed position in defense of the Union and the Constitution.

If the South has been solid it has been because of conditions imposed by the North, and she will remain solid so long as the general government and the people of the North deny her equal participation in the rights and privileges of American citizenship.

Mr. Cleveland attempted to restore the government to its pristine glory, and re-establish an American sentiment superior to sectionalism; and because of this attempt he was assailed, with more than barbaric savagery, and slain in the Capitol of the Republic.

We trust that General Harrison will be more fortunate in his crusade against sectionalism. We trust he will rise superior to party and give to the country an American administration...

Torpedo and Other Fast Ships.

In the Scientific American of November 3 last we gave illustrations of the new American torpedo boat Vesuvius, which carries the novel pneumatic guns and discharges torpedoes loaded with nitro-glycerine.

In torpedo boats, owing to their narrowness of beam in order to secure speed, it is essential that all the weights be kept as low as possible to insure stability...

By the above system the entire fire box and furnace is inclosed, as it were, in a complete envelope or casing, the upper part of which extends well above the water line...

Our new ships of war now in process of construction are being built, for the most part, after English plans and drawings, not of the most recent date.

As an example, take the armored turret cruiser Maine, the construction of which has been commenced at the Navy Yard in Brooklyn.

This ship is to be of 6,500 tons, 310 feet long, 57 feet beam, 8,740 horse power, calculated speed 19 1/2 miles per hour.
