**A BIG railroad trust** seems the next thing imminent.

It is expected that Dakota and two or three other States will be admitted into the Union during the present Congress.

It has been reported that Mary Anderson, Edwin Booth and Lawrence Barrett have made a theatrical combination for the winter season.

**M. UERTENSTEIN**, President of Switzerland, who recently underwent the amputation of his right leg because of disease of the bone, is dead.

The Italian Senate has rejected, by a vote of 79 to 23, a proposal to give illiterate persons the right to vote at elections for local administrative officials.

Rumors asserting that Emperor William was seriously sick were freely circulated in Berlin about the last of November and had a depressing effect.

The steamer Gulf Stream which for several days was reported missing reached Charleston on the 30th ult. She experienced a gale on the 25th that drove her three hundred miles from her course.

CONGRESS is in session. It is suggested that it is the policy of the Democrats of the House to pass the Blair bill so as to escape obnoxious amendments that the Republicans would put upon it if the matter goes over to the next Congress.

**HENRY GEORGE**, in an address in London, November 27th, said that the grasping land in America was rapidly making that country similar to England. He wanted to utterly abolish landlordism and to grant every child a share in the soil.

It has been suggested that the townships hold conventions before the Legislature meets for the purpose of expressing a preference for a United States Senator to succeed Senator Ransom.—Bladen Beacon. We believe in listening to the voice of the people, but we have no idea that they would attend primaries for the purpose indicated. Every member of the Legislature will be posted as to the wishes of his constituents and will govern himself accordingly.

Work has begun on the rebuilding of the Cuthbert machine shops, lately destroyed by fire, on Craven street. The building will be of brick.

The Superior Court was in session yesterday at work on the civil docket. The calendar for Monday was disposed of without a single case going to the jury.

The block in the canal caused by the storm over a week ago has been raised and the steamers between New Berne and Norfolk are now running on regular time.

The beautiful steam yacht Rava, belonging to P. Lorillard came into port yesterday. Mr. Lorillard, his daughter and son-in-law will go from here to Charleston by rail and the boat will be taken around by water.

As conference will not adjourn until tonight the Tobacco will not sail until tomorrow morning when, if a sufficient party is made up, it will go to Washington. Persons desiring to be of the party will hand their names to Rev. Mr. Downum or notify the agent of the Eastern Carolina Dispatch.

A meeting of the ladies of New Berne is requested on Wednesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock in the Presbyterian lecture room, to hear an address from Mrs. Wells of Chattanooga, Tenn., who visits the city in the interest of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. A large attendance is earnestly requested.

The Winter Resort Association, Washington Bryan, President, and Geo. Allen, Secretary, has published a remarkable neat pamphlet, setting forth in attractive form the advantages of New Berne as a winter resort. The Association is fully alive to the work, and if visitors are not attracted to this city it will not be the fault of its members.

**Death of John H. Beeton.** Mr. John H. Beeton, of this city, died yesterday morning about one o'clock, at his residence on East Front street, aged about 60 years.

Mr. Beeton's health had been failing for some time past, and death was, perhaps a relief to him, though a sore affliction to a beloved wife, daughter and two sons. Several years ago while travelling in the insurance business in the surrounding counties he acted in the capacity of correspondent for the then Kingston Journal and his letters were read with much interest. He was afterward connected with the Daily Natibell, published in this city, and later was editor and proprietor of the Pamlico Enterprise. He was a good writer, a scholar and a Christian gentleman.

The funeral will take place this afternoon from the M. E. Church at 3:30 o'clock. Friends of the family, and the public are invited to attend.

## THE METHODISTS IN COUNCIL.

The N. C. Conference of the M. E. Church South.

**FIFTH DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.** Conference convened at 9:30 a. m. Devotional exercises by Rev. Thos. H. Peggam.

Called to order by the Bishop. Secretary read the minutes of Saturday which were approved.

On motion of Rev. J. T. Harris, W. L. Arnold, a lay delegate of the New Berne district, was excused from further attendance at conference and B. J. Bell substituted in his place.

Dr. R. O. Burton presented report of Littleton Female College which was referred to the board of education.

On motion of Rev. F. L. Reid, J. D. McKinney, a lay delegate of Raleigh district, was excused from further attendance and Millard Myer substituted in his place.

Under question 9 the Bishop reported that he had on Saturday ordained Daniel C. Gaddy a Deacon, and on Sunday morning the following were ordained: Jno. D. Peggam, Chas. W. Robinson, Thos. N. Ivey, Z. J. Needham, Martin T. Steels, Zadoc Paris, James G. Johnson, George F. Smith, Henry B. Anderson, Richard W. Townsend, E. H. Davis.

Under question 10 he announced the following local preachers ordained: Deacons: Samuel Y. Brown, Benj. F. Fincher, Leonidas M. Chaffin, J. A. Edwards, Jesse M. Marlowe, and Samuel P. Douglass.

Under question 13, he announced the following ordained as Elders: Wm. R. Ware, John A. Hornaday, Conder P. Jerome, Duncan A. Futrell, W. W. Roe, John E. Wooley, Charles C. Brothers, W. J. Crowley, Enoch L. Stamey.

Under question 15 he announced the following local preachers ordained: Elders: Lewis L. Smith, Furney S. Beeton.

John R. Sawyer, who was unable to go before the regular committee and who was examined by special committee, passed the examination of character and was continued on trial.

Rev. Solomon Pool passed the examination of character and was continued on trial.

It was announced that Rev. Mr. Gnyton, who was absent when called, had arrived.

Question 20 was taken up, viz: Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?

The Elders of Durham district, Greensboro district, Mt. Airy, and Statesville, passed the examination of character.

The Bishop called the attention of the conference to the importance of fixing the hour for memorial services.

After discussion, on motion of Rev. L. L. Nash, Tuesday at 11:30 o'clock was fixed as the hour.

Question 20 was resumed. The Elders of Shelby district and Charlotte passed the examination of character.

The Bishop announced that the hour for the special order, viz: The educational interest of the conference, had arrived.

Rev. W. C. Gannon stated that the board of education was not ready to report because the various reports of the several institutions had not been handed in and consequently they had no facts to base report on.

President Crowell of Trinity College, not being present, the special order, after discussion, was postponed until 11:30 o'clock.

Question 20 was resumed: The Elders of Salisbury and Trinity College districts passed the examination of character.

Rev. Mr. Foster of the New York Conference, was introduced to the conference and explained the value of a cyclopedia of which he is the author.

The special order was announced and President Crowell of Trinity College, came forward and read a very elaborate report of that institution. He explained why the preparatory department had been discontinued, why the organization had been divided into two departments, the Academic and Scientific, and gave much information about the work and made some valuable suggestions as to what the college needs.

He presented figures in reference to the financial department embracing the years 1875 to 1884 inclusive, which were not at all creditable to the conference in its educational work. At one period it seemed that it had almost abandoned its only college, and but for the great love and sacrifice of a few devoted professors, who stood by the institution, Trinity would probably have been numbered with the things of the past. Since 1884, however, the President shows that the college is on the up grade, interest is growing and Trinity is gaining the confidence of the young men of the State. The doing away with the preparatory department he thought would destroy a great deal of prejudice that existed against Trinity in other preparatory and high schools. He also advanced some capital ideas about adding an industrial department and aiding young men, who showed a willingness to help themselves. We regret that we have not space for his entire report, as it contains matters of great interest to the Methodists of North Carolina. One fact which he placed special emphasis upon, viz: that whatever he might do, the professors of Trinity College will not work in the future without being paid their salaries in full. If the conference did not take interest enough in the institution to see that the professors were paid for their work they had better close its doors. He thanked God, however, that while the College was not out of adversity the future was brightening.

His report was referred to the Board of Education.

On motion of Dr. Burton this subject, the educational interest of the church, was made special order for Tuesday 10:30 a. m. at which time the Board of Education would be expected to make their report.

Rev. L. L. Nash moved that five thousand copies of President Crowell's address be published for distribution, he, Mr. Nash, to assume the responsibility of raising the funds for the expense of publication. The motion was adopted.

The following trustees for Trinity College were confirmed: Rev. J. T. Harris, Rev. F. L. Reid, Wm. G. Barkhead, W. R. Odell, Rev. V. A. Sharpe, Rev. J. A. Cunningham, Judge E. T. Boykin and M. I. House.

After announcements the conference adjourned to 9:30 o'clock this morning. Benediction by the Bishop.

**NOTE**—In Sunday's issue it was stated that Rev. J. T. Gibbs made a speech in opposition to Dr. Burton's resolution on pastoral address. This was an error, Capt. R. B. Crawford of Winston, a brother of Rev. L. W. Crawford, and a lay delegate, was the gentleman mistaken for Rev. Mr. Gibbs. His speech was of the best made on the question.

**Steamer Movements.**

The Deafance of the Clyde line arrived last night from Baltimore with a heavy cargo of goods.

The L. A. Cobb made her first trip from Bell's Ferry yesterday, bringing sixty-five bales of cotton.

The Newberne of the O. D. line arrived Sunday and sailed yesterday for Norfolk with full cargo. The Manteo arrived last night and will sail this morning.

The Eaglet of the E. C. D. line arrived with cargo of general merchandise and sailed yesterday afternoon with full cargo. The Vesper of this line will arrive today and sail this afternoon.

**Meeting of County Commissioners.**

The new board of county commissioners, viz: James A. Bryan, E. W. Smallwood, J. A. Meadows, Daniel Lane and Wm. Cleave, convened at the court house yesterday and the oath of office was administered by E. W. Carpenter, C. S. C.

Jas. A. Bryan was elected chairman. The newly elected county officers were present for the purpose of tendering their bonds.

The first offered was that of Robt. Hancock, jr., for Register of Deeds. He was represented by Clark & Clark. The county by Simmons & Manly.

We have not the names of the sureties on the bond, but after a long discussion by counsel, the board decided that the sureties, several of whom live out of the county, should appear in person and give evidence of their property and liabilities, and to enable Mr. Hancock to secure their attendance he was given until Tuesday of next week.

The other officers were given until the same time.

The board will be in session today. In this the board is perfectly right. After the experience of the past they ought to exercise the greatest care in passing upon bonds. They should not only investigate the liabilities of the parties going on bonds, but it strikes us that it would be the part of prudence to require the parties to own property in the county. One living in another county can dispose of his property and no record of it would be made here, while if within the county the commissioners, having access to the records, can notify the official at any time to increase his bond.

At the M. E. Church Bishop Cranberry preached an able sermon to a crowded house. It was appropriate to the occasion of the solemn ceremonies of ordaining a large class as Deacons. At night the church was again crowded to its full capacity, and Dr. H. H. Harty entertained them on a subject of deep interest. He told them how the church had risen under the desolation of poverty immediately after the war, and that the future safety of the country depended upon the church. After the sermon the Deacons ordained a number of Elders, the services being very solemn and impressive.

At the Presbyterian Church Dr. A. W. Mangum preached to a full house, in the morning, and services were held in the same church at night by Rev. W. H. Moore.
