The condition of John Bright is changed again for the worse.

The Supreme Court decides that U. S. bonds are liable to taxation.

On Tuesday the Alabama House of representatives passed a bill adding \$100,000 to the public school fund.

A RECOUNT of the vote in one county in West Virginia elects a Democratic Congressman and possibly the Governor of the State.

The Southern whites are not going to be bossed and dominated by the negroes. Ingalls and his tribe would do well to understand that.—Wil. Star.

GEN. LONGSTREET has been banqueted at Indianapolis. Among the guests were Russell Harrison, son of the President-elect and Private Secretary Halford. Longstreet is sure to work his Republicanism for all it is worth.

By the promotion of Judges Avery and Shepherd there will be two vacancies on the Superior Court Bench in this State. The question arises, who will fill the vacancy. Governor Seales will have the right to do so, but it has been suggested that it would be a proper courtesy to Governor-elect Fowle to allow the vacancies to remain until after the inauguration on the twentieth of January.

In the House on Tuesday, many bills were introduced, including one for the construction of two steel rams, to be armed with heavy rifled dynamite guns, and one for the construction of two steel cruisers to be armed with dynamite guns. Mr. McDonald, of Minnesota, presented petitions of citizens of North Dakota for immediate admission into the Union of South Dakota and Montana, and for constitutional conventions in North Dakota, Washington and New Mexico. Referred to Committee on Territories.

SOON after the meeting of the House on Tuesday, Hon. W. C. Oates, of Alabama, rose to a question of privilege, and stated that he had been misrepresented. Continuing he remarked: "I said that the only way that the Repub-

licans could break the solidly Democratic South was by eliminating the negro from politics, and that is practicable by adopting a constitutional amendment limiting the suffrage to white men, but that it was not probable that any such thing would be proposed by them during Harrison's administration if ever. Such a movement would not stand the ghost of a chance of success if inaugurated by a Southern Democrat."

"How the negro fares," is being ascertained by the World through intelligent colored men in the South. Among those heard from are four residents of North Carolina—James H. Jones, of Raleigh, who was body servant to President Jefferson Davis, says: "We hope for an administration which will be just to the whole people, particularly to the Southern people. We have no political rights here that are not freely accorded us. The elections are perfectly quiet and no colored man has any right to complain. The colored people here are shown the most exact justice. They have good schools carefully looked after." The three others reside in Durham, and are W. G. Pearson, principal of the public school for colored children, J. W. Wright and C. N. Hunter, teacher in the colored graded school. All of them say: "Harrison has the confidence of the colored people. I know of no intimidation of colored voters."

A Democratic Sheriff for Greene County.

For the last several years Greene county has, by the careless manner in which the General Assembly appointed the Justices of the Peace, had a Republican board of county commissioners. The last General Assembly exercised a little more care and prudence in the matter so that the Justices were enabled last June to elect three of the best men in the county. In the recent election one Dixon was elected sheriff. The Democrats of the county voted like sensible men and kept off his bond and the consequence was he could not come to time, and Mr. John Sugg, one of the best men in the county, was elected to fill the vacancy.

What a Little "Ad" Did.

A gentleman living in Jones county writes that he put a little "ad" in the JOURNAL a few years ago which cost him two or three dollars, and it has paid him between seventy-five and one hundred dollars and it keeps on paying him as it was the means of his starting a little business which is constantly growing.

Judge James E. Shephard.

The official vote as declared by the State board of canvassers puts Judge Shephard in the lead by several hundred votes. There is not a more painstaking, upright, impartial and industrious Judge in the State than Judge Shephard.

They rather created a sympathy for the Judge as the vote plainly shows. He will prove a useful Judge on the Supreme Bench, having the physical as well as legal ability to do a great deal of work.

EDITOR JOURNAL—As the office of Treasurer has been declared vacant and the commissioners will soon appoint a Treasurer, I know of no better man for said office than Thomas Daniels.

He was the Democratic candidate for Treasurer some years ago and of course was defeated, and his opponent failing to give bond the commissioners appointed Thos. J. Latham, a very excellent man. But was it just to Mr. Daniels? Now is the time to repair the wrong. Every one that knows Mr. Daniels knows that he will be the right man in the right place. He will make a good Treasurer and will give a good bond. He made an excellent Treasurer of the Masonic Lodge, and also City Treasurer. The money was always ready and paid on the proper voucher. If the commissioners see fit to elect Mr. Daniels, I don't think they will have cause to regret it, and therefore I place his name before the board and hope that he will be elected, for the good of the public.

From Washington.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The River and Harbor Committee spent several hours today in work upon the details of the River and Harbor bill for the next fiscal year. The committee will not hear any delegations desiring to urge claims of their particular localities to an appropriation, as a great deal of testimony was taken last year, and as there is very little time for work, the purpose being to have the bill ready for action by the House before the holidays. The committee has fixed \$10,000,000 as the aggregate amount of the appropriation to be carried by the bill.

The bill introduced by Representative Oates of Alabama, today, to regulate immigration, provides that no alien shall be admitted into the United States who is an idiot, insane or pauper who has been legally convicted of any crime involving moral turpitude, who is a polygamist, anarchist or socialist, who is affected with any contagious or loathsome disease, or who is under contract to perform labor in the United States. It makes it misdemeanor, punishable by fine of \$1,000, or imprisonment for three years, for any alien forbidden to enter the United States, to come into this country, and makes the same provision with regard to those who assist prohibited classes of immigrants to land here. A tax of twenty-five dollars is levied upon each immigrant, which is made a lien upon the property of the transporting company bringing such immigrant. The bill provides machinery for carrying its provisions into effect.

An adjourned meeting of the Board of City Council was held this evening at 7:30 o'clock, Mayor Meadows in the chair. Present—Councilmen Williams, Ulrich, Lane, Crawford, Simmons and Thomas.

H. H. Tooker presented a petition to erect a frame building 14x16 feet, to be covered with tin, at the foot of Middle street. On motion it was granted.

The chairman of the department committee reported repairs to New Berne engine boiler, and the fire department committee was instructed to correspond with Button Engine Company as regards defects in the boiler, and the guarantee.

The Marshal's report read and received.

We have made 13 arrests during the month—all convicted. Costs collected, \$30.40. One-half the cost was deducted for my fees. JAS. T. LEWIS, C. M.

Finance committee made no report.

Chairman sanitary committee reported the sanitary condition of the city good.

Chairman of police made an unfavorable report as regards persons resisting police officers in the discharge of duty. The following ordinance was adopted:

Be it ordained, That from and after this date it shall be unlawful for any party or parties to have any festival, cake walk or parade without first having obtained permission from the Mayor. Any violation of the above ordinance will subject the offender to a fine of fifty dollars or imprisonment for 30 days.

Chairman of cemeteries committee reported the condition of the same good.

Monthly bills allowed.

I have demanded a church trial which will take place just as soon as I can get out. In reference to the Odd Fellows certificate, I have this only to say: That I borrowed the sum of \$25.00 in the year 1885, from a gentleman in this place. A member of the Lodge endorsed my note, and when the time came for payment (three months), I declined to pay said note as the endorser owed me the sum of \$25.00 for clerical labor. This was the cause of the action of said Lodge.

In reference to the action of the Masonic Lodge I have to say: That I was summoned to appear at that Lodge on Nov. 23d, 1888, for trial for publishing the card in the Record of October 28th. I was at the time and am now confined to my house and bed with a severe attack of rheumatism. I wrote a note to the Lodge asking that the trial be postponed until I could get out, be present in person, and have such witnesses and affidavits present as was necessary, in order to make my defenses. The night of November 23d was the stormiest of the year, but few members I learn was present. I was tried (a mere farce), without counsel and condemned without a hearing. Why this haste? Potter must be bolstered up in the trial with Rev. J. B. Bobbitt. I have served notice of appeal upon the Lodge, to the Grand Lodge, and will then and there have a TRIAL.
