Bonding Officers.

We have always tried to discuss questions with moderation and to treat individuals with fairness, justice and courtesy. In referring to the bonding of the county officers recently elected, we plainly declared our conviction that Democrats could not consistently place their names upon the bonds of the Republicans who have been elected to give bond before the county commissioners. We have repeat that declaration with emphasis.

The county commissioners assembled on Monday last to pass upon the bonds that might be offered. It is known an adjournment for a week has been taken, and it is understood, for the purpose of allowing parties interested to bring their bondsmen before the commissioners. This consideration for the Republicans who wish to be inducted into office is a courtesy creditable to the fairness and toleration of the commissioners, but in striking contrast with the very recent action of neighboring counties, where the Republicans elected presented unsatisfactory bonds and they were rejected at once and immediately Democrats were chosen for the offices.

Right here we say to the commissioners that their duty is comprehensive. The interest of every citizen in every sphere of life, in Craven county, is under their protection, but chiefly is the property of the county and that of the citizens to be guarded and the personal liberty of each is to be considered and protected by them.

The bond of every officer should be based upon property within the immediate supervision of the commissioners. This statement is sure to be just as soon as made, if looked at clearly. A bond given upon property in a western county or State can be made worthless at any time without the knowledge of the commissioners by transfer of such property, and it is their duty to know when any officer's bond is affected by change of circumstances. They could not protect the county and people if distant parties are upon the bonds. The bond is important, the law requires it, but the character, the personnel, the honor and morality of the bonder should be equally made the inspection of this high commission in the discharge of its all important trust. We believe the commissioners will meet their obligations by exacting bonds secured by property under their own eyes, and that they will not overlook the necessity for that high tone of moral integrity which places the office holder above his bond in the estimation of his fellow citizens.
