It is said that England will not recognize the United States during the Cleveland administration. Mr. Phelps may be recalled. What then?

Now it is said the Panama Canal is not a failure after all, but is rapidly moving to successful completion. Reports in regard to it have been about as unsatisfactory as those in regard to Harrison's Cabinet.

EMIN PASHA and Henry M. Stanley have been captured in Africa. It is rumored that Osman Digna, in his letter, expressed a willingness to surrender Emin Pasha and his white companion provided Egypt would agree to abandon Suakin.

MR. POWDERLY says: "Notwithstanding all reports to the contrary, the order of the Knights of Labor is neither bankrupt nor extinct. What has been lost to the organization in numbers has been gained in strength, devotion and determination."

In the Inter-State Immigration Convention at Montgomery, Col. W. H. S. Bergwyn, of Henderson, introduced resolutions proposing that the Southern States hold a Southern exposition in either New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago, Kansas City or St. Paul in 1891 and 1892.

On Wednesday Senators Reagan, Chase, Dawes and Hancock drifted into a debate as to what caused the defeat of the Democratic party at the late election, the Republicans claiming that the President's free trade advocacy did it while the Democrats claimed it had not so much to do with it as his veto of the pension bill and his keeping Republicans in office.

On the 13th of December Senator Stewart introduced a bill authorizing the Secretary of War, Secretary of the Navy and General of the Army, acting as a board, to have constructed 300 pneumatic torpedo throwers of the highest power operating under a pressure

of from 3,000 to 5,000 pounds per square inch and capable of throwing steel torpedoes charged with not less than 500 pounds of dynamite or other explosive a distance of five miles. These torpedo throwers are to be mounted in batteries for the defense of the principle harbors in the United States. The cost of these throwers shall not exceed \$40,000 each, and \$10,000,000 is appropriated to carry out the provisions of the act.

THE Southern Inter-State Immigration Convention, lately in session at Montgomery, Ala., formed a permanent Inter-State Bureau, and among others passed the following resolution:

Resolved, That the South offers grander and greater opportunities and inducements to labor and capital than any other country on the face of the globe; that there are yet to be found within the borders of the States here represented in this Convention, a larger acreage of unoccupied agricultural and horticultural lands open to settlement and occupancy, at less price per acre than can be found in any other portion of the United States; that in her mineral and timber resources she is destined to lead the whole world; that the South needs immigration, and the kind of immigration wanted is that which is intelligent and energetic, men who are capable of producing something in addition to their immediate necessities.

Ex-Governor W. W. Holden's Appeal. The following appeal to the General Assembly is made by Ex-Governor W. W. Holden:

To the General Assembly of North Carolina, assembled on the 23d day of March, 1871, the Senate of North Carolina sitting as a Court of Impeachment, pronounced judgment against me in six out of eight articles of impeachment filed against me by the House of Representatives. I was held by this judgment as guilty of "high crime and misdemeanors." I deny this in the most solemn manner. I do not ask you to repeal or rescind this sentence or judgment, for it is being executed, and it may not be repealed or rescinded save by the same court that passed it, but I ask you most earnestly to resolve or declare that in your opinion, I was actuated by good motives in what I did, and that I had for my object the best and highest interests of the State. I am not now a party man. Both parties have disowned me. I appeal to you solely on the ground of justice. I have never been an enemy to the State. On the contrary, I have loved her well, and do now, and am her loyal son, though proscribed and banished. The press of the State will please copy the above card as an act of kindness to a former member of the craft and send me a copy of the paper.

W. W. HOLDEN. Whenever Ex-Governor Holden admits that he did the State a great wrong and that the Senate of North Carolina did right in pronouncing judgment against him, and he asks pardon of the people, then, and not till then, are the law-abiding, liberty-loving people of North Carolina willing to pardon him. We do not see what Mr. Holden has done to convince the people of North Carolina that he is declaring two counties of the State in insurrection; organizing a military force under such men as Kirk; arresting some of the best citizens of the State to be tried by a military court, refusing to obey the mandates of the highest judicial authority, he was actuated by good motives and had for his object the best and highest interest of the State.

The people of North Carolina have not forgotten nor will they ever forget those who joined in this outrage upon the Constitution of the State and upon their liberties. If we remember aright, quite a number of Republicans, then members of the Senate, voted to convict Governor Holden on several of the articles of impeachment, showing that his conviction was not merely for the gratification of party feeling, but to vindicate the laws and the courts of North Carolina. We are of the opinion that the Ex-Governor had just as well withdraw his appeal or put it in altogether a different shape. Acknowledge the great wrong you did the people of North Carolina and implore their pardon while it is yet time.

Kinston Items.

Many of the members of the College will go home to spend the Christmas holidays.

There was a shooting match today for turkeys, near town. About forty of the fowls were won.

The cold weather is here, and still no news of any forthcoming events that usually characterize the season.

The larger pupils of Kinston College will give a Christmas reception to invited guests at the College on Thursday night of next week.

The Kinston Rifle Club are organized. The members will get their new repeating rifles early in January. There are about thirty members. They will have a target practice as soon as they receive their weapons.

There will be a Melange Societe at the residence of Mr. E. F. Cox, on King street, on Friday night, Dec. 28th, for the benefit of the Ladies Aid Society of the Baptist Church. All are invited to attend. First class refreshments in every respect will be in readiness at moderate charges.

On Thursday night there was quite an interesting performance at Loftin's opera house. Fourteen young ladies were bid off at auction. J. Q. Jackson, Esq., who is always ready for good work, was the auctioneer, and a good one too. Prices ranged from ten cents up to five dollars. The ladies were arranged in line upon the stage, all covered with newspapers. The bidders did not know the names of any one present; but bid, as boys swap knives, "sight unseen." All the ladies were sold. Miss Mattie H. Rountree brought the highest price. The entertainment was a very pleasant affair and afforded much amusement. The receipts, we are told, amounted to about forty dollars, and were for the Ladies Aid Society of the M. E. Church of this place. The sale of the "boys" came off last night. There were ten sold. Our worthy Mayor was the last one disposed of, and brought the highest price of the lot. Prices ranged from five cents to two hundred and fifty mills. There was quite a goodly number of spectators. The proceeds went for the same object as before. One of the young gentlemen, without knowing whom he was bidding for, was lucky enough to purchase the "very one" he wanted, on Thursday night.

N. C. STATE GRANGE, P. OF H. At the annual meeting of the N. C. State Grange, P. of H., held in Kinston last week, the following resolutions were adopted:

A resolution recommending the diversification of crops, planting less cotton and tobacco and raising more home supplies.

A resolution favoring the protection and sawing of timber, recommending that farmers should not destroy their forests but should reserve timber sufficient for farm use.

A resolution recommending that farmers manufacture as nearly as possible all fertilizers used on their farms.

A resolution recommending size for cotton bales, that the weight be about 200 lbs., and that wire be used for tying the bales. Also that a covering of uniform weight be used in order that there may be no loss arising on account of tare, etc.

A resolution condemning the recent increase in the price of fertilizers, it being believed that the cause thereof has its origin in the foundation of a Fertilizer Trust Combination.

A resolution asking the Legislature to create a railroad commission.

A resolution asking the Legislature to pass a law prohibiting the giving away of convict labor to the railroads and other corporations.

A resolution requesting the Legislature to pass a law reducing the fees of county officers fifty per cent.

A resolution asking the Legislature to pass a law prohibiting the introduction of unbranded and adulterated food or drugs, and the offering for sale of all such goods, whether put up out of the State or in it.

A resolution asking the Legislature to institute inquiry as to whether the railroads of the State are performing their duties to the public as prescribed in their charters.

A resolution asking that transportation of farm products, etc., be made more easy between the eastern and western portions of the State, that farmers may not be forced to send their products out of the State in order to get them from the one section to the other at the lowest cost.

A resolution favoring co-operation among all farmers irrespective of organization.

The committee on agriculture recommended the cultivation of grasses and forage, and the keeping of as much stock as the respective farms will support. To raise sufficient forage to keep the stock in thrifty condition, etc. The committee also recommended the keeping of books on the farm, that the farmer may know at the end of the year what it has cost him to cultivate his crop and what he has made.

Newton, Catawba county, was chosen as the next place of meeting.

Hon. W. E. Williams of Pitt county was re-elected master.

Resolutions of thanks were passed to the railroads, steamers, navigation companies, hotels, etc.

About sixty members took the 5th degree on Wednesday.

The meeting was full of life. The order has prospered during the year. The finances are in good condition.

Co-operative stores are such dangerous things to tamper with that no committee would recommend them. It requires tact and cash to conduct them successfully.

S. H. Rountree of Lenoir was elected lecturer. W. H. Powell of Edgecombe and G. T. Ridley of Northampton were elected members of the executive committee.

J. T. Eaton of Currituck is continued as general deputy.

Much work was done. The reports

of the committee contain many excellent suggestions and recommendations. There was much intelligence among the members. There was some fine speaking, but as a general thing the meeting was one of business instead of talking.

It is hoped that much good will result from the action of the meeting, which was a farmer's assembly in the true significance of such an assembly.
