LONDON is agitated over the possibility of a rupture between Germany and the United States, growing out of the Samoan affair.

THE New York World promises to send an expedition to Africa to find Stanley and Emin. Thomas A. Stevens, who made himself famous by his tour around the globe on a bicycle, will lead the new expedition.

THE Richmond Times says: A reporter claims to have heard from Edison that we may expect soon to have aerial navigation, and that one of its effects will be to increase crime, as criminals might escape without being overtaken by telegraphic messages.

LET us have the Railroad Commission. Inasmuch as scientists say that violent wind storms are increased by the destruction of forests it might be well to have a commission for the protection and renewal of forests, as one safeguard against hurricanes.

THERE is intense excitement in Paris over the Bonlangier movement. The election for delegate from the Department of the Seine, for which the General is a candidate, takes place on the 27th inst. It is believed that Bonlangier will be elected and that fighting will follow.

THE World says: "There is neither room nor demand for two high tariff parties in this country. The Republicans have pre-empted that ground. And if they had not, no party calling itself Democratic could defend and perpetuate a tariff for bounties and protection for monopolies."

THE prosecution of the Sugar Trust, in New York, was successful, but Judge Barrett, in his decision, freely confesses that lack of legislation renders him powerless to impose adequate penalties on the offending corporation. This is a valuable pointer, not only to the Legislature of New York, but to the Legislatures of other States.

Mrs. AURELIA V. ROTHWELL, of Elmira, N. Y., has made a strange confession to the chief of police. She says she has been sending anonymous letters of a mischief-making to scores of people. She has lived a dual life outwardly that of an exemplary Christian woman, secretly that of a mischief-maker and scandal breeder. Families have been broken up, friends alienated, societies disorganized and the shadow of suspicion thrown over reputable and innocent people by her pernicious messages.
