LEGISLATION.

The National and State Legislatures are in session.

The Congress is doing little, and that little is in favor of monopoly and plutocracy.

Grave Senators, men representing sovereign States, boldly advocate, and zealously defend, measures that are contrary to the spirit of the Constitution and oppressive to a majority of the people of these States.

The tariff of the robber barons is entrenched in the American Senate, and there is no power at present to drive it from its stronghold.

But the contest cannot be abandoned. Whatever record other States may have made upon the supreme political question of the day, the colors of North Carolina have been carried to the front and wave defiantly in the face of the foe.

"If we conquer," said the Athenian commander on the morning of Marathon's great day, "if we conquer, we shall make Athens the greatest city of Greece." "If we conquer," our leader may exclaim, "if we conquer, we will make America the greatest nation on earth. The sails of our commerce will whiten every sea, and the products of our farms and workshops will go to the ends of the world. Our homes will be the habitations of independent freemen, and the blessed abodes of peace, plenty and happiness!

Let it not be supposed that tariff reform is a hopeless venture. Its coming may be delayed for a time, but the light that streams across the eastern sky is the sure harbinger of coming day.

The Legislature of the State of North Carolina will meet its responsibilities with the moderation and wisdom that have always characterized its deliberations. What measures may be adopted the future must determine, but judging from the spirit of the people and the signs of the times, we confidently believe that justice will be done North Carolinians who followed the Confederate flag until it went down baptised in the best blood of the nation, by the passage of a pension bill which will relieve the sufferings of brave men and be creditable to our beloved State.

Bills for the creation of a Railroad Commission have already been introduced in the Senate and House of Representatives. We have not seen these bills and cannot speak intelligently of their provisions, but, supposing that it is the purpose of the Legislature to follow the lead of Georgia and Alabama, whose Commissions have been in the highest degree beneficial, we approve the measure in the full confidence that it will result in the general good of the people.

Other measures have been introduced which will be considered as their merits are unfolded in the General Assembly.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

SIXTH DAY.

The Senate met pursuant to adjournment.

Prayer by Rev. J. H. Cordon, of this city.

The morning hour was taken up in presentation of the petitions, bills and resolutions, together with reports from standing committees.

By Mr. Reed: Bill to repeal chapter 144, laws of 1887, in relation to impounding stock: Referred to the committee on propositions and grievances.

Message from the House of Representatives, announcing that at 12 o'clock m. it will be pleased to receive the Senate in joint session for the purpose of canvassing the election returns for State officers.

Mr. Banks of Wake, introduced a bill to abolish the office of County Superintendent of Education. Referred to the committee on education.

The following is the Senate committee on finance: Mr. Payne, chairman; Messrs. Reid, Tomp, Long, Leeper, Smith, Means, Abbott, Campbell, Moore, Turner of Catawba, Rice and Thomas.

Senate bills 36 and 39: Bills to amend the State election laws were taken from the calendar and referred to the committee on judiciary.

The Senate announced as the Senate branch of the special joint committee on railroad commission, Mr. Payne, chairman; Messrs. Pou, Reid and Thomas.

The Senate in a body repaired to the hall of the House of Representatives to participate in the

which in accordance with law was to meet to canvass the election returns for State officers.

The Speaker of the House announced that the votes from all the counties of the State had been duly returned, compared and counted, and as the result of that count declared that Daniel G. Fowle, having received a majority of the votes cast for Governor at the election held on the 6th day of November, A. D., 1888, was the duly elected Governor of North Carolina for the term of four years, beginning on the first day of January, A. D., 1889, that Thomas M. Holt, for Lieutenant Governor; William L. Saunders, for Secretary of State; George W. Sanderlin, for Auditor; Donald W. Bain, for Treasurer; Sidney M. Finger, for Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Theodore F. Davidson, for Attorney General, each having received a majority of the votes cast for their various positions at the same election, were declared duly elected to their respective offices for the same term of four years.

The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House appended their names to the report of the tellers.

Lieutenant Governor Stedman declared that the purpose for which the joint session was called was accomplished, and declared it adjourned, and the members of the Senate returned to their chamber.

HOUSE.

At 11 o'clock a. m. the House was called to order by Mr. Leazar, the Speaker, and the journal of yesterday was read and approved. Prayer by the Rev. J. H. Cordon of this city.

RESOLUTIONS.

Mr. Alexander: Instructing the Secretary of State to furnish the justices of the peace of the State with the landlord act. Judiciary.

Mr. Doughton: In relation to the Governor's mansion. Joint committee to consider all questions.

BILLS.

By Mr. Coffield: To regulate assignments. Judiciary.

By the same: In relation to assignments and the duty of trustees. Judiciary.

Mr. Watson: To amend chapter 44, Code, relating to fees, crop liens, &c. Salaries and fees.

Mr. Bridgers: To allow the people of the State to elect their own officers. Committee on cities, towns and counties.

Mr. Hussey: In relation to convicts. Penal institutions.

Mr. McGill: For the benefit of ex-Confederate soldiers. Education.

Mr. Pearson: To require the teaching of the rudiments of agriculture in the public schools. Committee on education.

Mr. Chadwick: To amend chapter 171, laws 1885, in relation to Sunday fishing. Fish and fish interests.

Mr. Cherry: To compel hucksters and butchers to keep a registration book. Propositions and grievances.

Mr. Carter: In relation to the protection of insane persons. Judiciary.

Mr. Mastin: In relation to the benefit of wounded Confederate soldiers and in the interest of economy. Finance.

The calendar was taken up and disposed of as follows: Mr. Dills moved that House bill 8 in regard to contested elections be taken up. Mr. Satton moved to lay upon the

table. Tabled. House bill 15, relating to the qualification of voters was also tabled. House bill 16, relating to changing the Code in regard to justices and sheriffs also tabled. House resolution 35, instructing members of Congress to repeal the internal revenue. Adopted. House bill 33, 36 and 42, in relation to the stock law. In consideration of these the House adjourned.

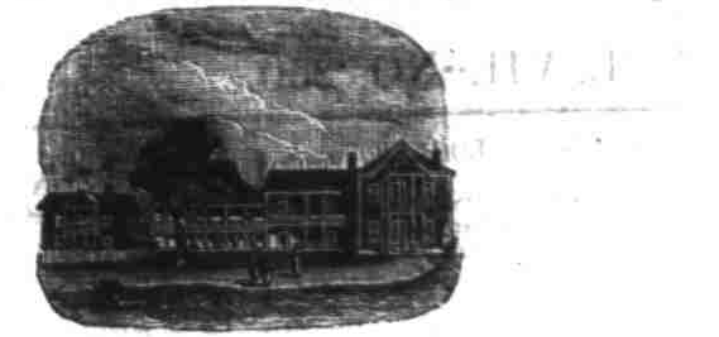

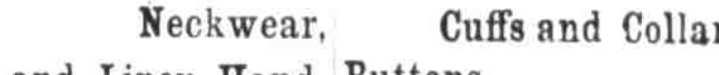
