THE Senate has confirmed the nomination of Walter L. Bragg, to succeed himself as Inter-State

Commissioner. We are glad of it. He is a sound lawyer, a true Democrat and a gentleman. He was a Captain in the Confederate army, and after the war located at Montgomery, Alabama, and greatly distinguished himself as Chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee.

The Wilmington Messenger is urging an increase of the appropriation for constructing a road to the National Cemetery. Ten thousand dollars has been appropriated by the House for that purpose and they want it increased to thirty thousand. The Messenger cites the fact that New Berne has twenty thousand, but it must remember that the road here will be about two miles long.

We have received from the marshals a complimentary ticket to the fifty-fourth anniversary exercises of the Euselean and Philomathesian Literary Societies of Wake Forest College on Friday, February 15th, 1889. It is even so, and our saw mills are constantly increasing their capacity and adding kilns and other machinery for manufacturing the lumber. Congdon & Son will soon have in operation the finest saw mill in the South.

But we ship too much raw lumber. It ought to be made into furniture, sash, doors, blinds, mouldings, balusters, &c. &c. No town or city in the round world is more favorably located for the manufacture of these goods than New Berne. We need a combination of the capital and brain of the city to start and operate these enterprises.

Remembering the Dead Heroes.

The ladies of the Hollywood Memorial Association have received through their secretary, Mrs. Edmund C. Minor, a check for \$18, sent by the Ladies' Memorial Association of New Berne, N. C., for the purpose of marking the graves of North Carolina soldiers buried in Hollywood. Mrs. Minor received only a short time since a check for \$457, collected by Governor Scales from all parts of North Carolina, in response to the appeal of the Hollywood Association, and this second donation is a part of the same fund, which came too late to be sent with the first supply, and was accordingly forwarded later. It will be remembered that Colonel Dawson, of the Charleston News and Courier, interested himself to very great purpose in behalf of the South Carolinians, and the liberal response from the Old North State has greatly encouraged the ladies in their noble work.

The Carolinians are as yet the only southern States which have seen fit to provide for the headstones of their own dead, though the ladies have appealed to all the late Confederate States for assistance, since Hollywood contains the dust of heroes from every State of the Southern Confederacy.—Richmond Dispatch.

Wrecked on Hatteras Shoals.
A telegram received in the city last night over the Signal Office wires announces that the barkentine Walter S. Massey, Captain Sherman, from Pernambuco to Hampton Roads was wrecked yesterday afternoon on Hatteras shoals. The crew of ten men were saved, but the vessel, with her cargo of sugar, will be a total loss. The barkentine is said to be broken in two. The wires refused to work shortly after the message was received and no additional information could be obtained. It is thought the vessel must have been in collision as no wind was blowing yesterday.—Norfolk Virginian.

A Murderer Twice Acquitted.
WINCHESTER, Jan. 19.—The jury in the Ridenour murder case were out only four hours, and brought in a verdict of not guilty. Immediately loud cheers arose from the great crowd assembled. Ridenour had been twice convicted and sentenced to be hanged. Upon the judge discharging the prisoner crowds pressed around him to congratulate him.

Boiler Explosion at Gainesville.
JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 18.—A Gainesville special says the boiler of the large fertilizer factory there exploded this afternoon, damaging the building to the extent of \$20,000. A large piece from the centre of the boiler struck an ice factory near by, demolishing a portion of it. No one was seriously injured.
