Business Men of New Berne.

We commend the following paragraph

every business place and manufactur-
ing industry in the city. But will the
business men of New Berne help us?
Do they want to know that New Berne
is a place of commercial and manufactur-
ing importance, or do they prefer to
remain in obscurity? Some of our
wide awake merchants have strange
notions about advertising. They resort
to every other means save the best of
all, the newspaper medium, yet they
are bound to know that they are indebt-
ed to the newspaper that goes out
every day and every week in the year
with unerring certainty to speak words
of praise for their town and to attract
trade hither. We venture the assertion
that there is not a merchant or business
man in the city of New Berne that has
not been benefited during the last six

exhibit from all the adjoining counties.

The Veterans' Organize.
The Confederate veterans met again
yesterday morning at **Metropolitan Hall**
at 10 o'clock as per adjournment. Pres-
ident **Carr** in the chair.

On motion a permanent organization
of the Confederate veterans of the State
was formed by the election of **Mr. Julian**
S. Carr as president and **Mr. W. C.**
Stromach as secretary. The privi-
lege was granted **Mr. Stromach** to em-
ploy an assistant if he found it neces-
sary. The name adopted was the **Confederate**
Veterans' Association of North
Carolina. The following excellent
executive committee was appointed:
Col. W. E. Beasley, **Oxford**; **Mr. C. H.**
Watson, **Winston**; **Col. W. H. S. Tur-**
gwyn, **Vance**; **Mr. J. E. Little**, **Rowan**;
Col. T. C. Fuller, **Richmond**; **Mr. M.**
Emery, **Halifax.**

Very flattering resolutions of thanks
were introduced and unanimously
adopted expressing the appreciation of
the convention of the eloquent address
of **Col. Fuller** (see **Ex-Posé** **Mr. Carr**
and others on the night before) and of
the courteous and able manner in which
the president, **Mr. Julian S. Carr**, pre-
sided over the convention.

Resolutions were unanimously adopted
thanking the citizens of **Edgemoor** for
their kind hospitality in entertaining
the soldiers and the railroads for trans-
porting them. A resolution thanking
the ladies for many attentions and
kindnesses was unanimously adopted.
A resolution to exclude all from the
convention except those bearing creden-
tials occasioned a spirited debate
in which **Col. Beasley** made eloquent
and ringing speech creating much en-
thusiasm.

Mr. Fenton, on behalf of **Mr. J. H.**
Wheeler, a veteran soldier of **Anson**,
presented to **Mr. President Carr**
the old flag of the **Anson Guards**, which
Mr. Wheeler had kept treasured away
ever since the surrender of this occa-
sion. **Mr. Wheeler** was sergeant of the
company.

On receiving the flag **Mr. Carr** said
there was nothing he honored and
cherished more than a tattered banner
of the Confederacy, and waving it over
his head gave a shout, when instantly
every old veteran in the hall of whom
there were two or three hundred rose
and rent the air with shouts till the hall
fairly reverberated.

Col. McCloud, of **Ashville**, who was
in the hall, was called upon for some
remarks and came forward and made a
short, ringing speech, eliciting enthu-
siastic applause. He made some valu-
able suggestions to the association.
After calling the roll of counties and
choosing a chairman for each county the
convention adjourned sine die.—
News and Observer, Jan. 24.
