**NEW YORK AND THE CABINET.**  
The World says: "If the Republic can gossip-mongers are correct in their report that Gen. Harrison has selected Mr. Blaine as Secretary of State and Senator Allison as Secretary of the Treasury in his Cabinet, it is clear that New York is to be relegated to a back seat in the new administration."

Since the foregoing was written, Gen. Harrison has again been heard from, and it is announced that Wanamaker has been named as Secretary of the Navy, and Alger as Secretary of War. If these appointments have been made there yet remains three Cabinet portfolios either one of which New York could accept without a sacrifice of honor.

The Postoffice Department has more appointments at its disposal than any department of the government, and ex-Senator Platt—the celebrated "Me Too"—is especially talented as a dispenser of patronage. The Interior Department is not much behind the Postoffice Department in the number and character of the appointments under its control, and Mr. Warner Miller would grind them out to the infinite satisfaction of a host of expectant followers. The Department of Justice has enough in it to satisfy the ambition of any ordinary mortal, not excepting William Maxwell Evarts himself.

We do not see that "New York is to be relegated to a back seat in the new administration," nor do we see that she is to have a place at the Cabinet table at all.

The World continuing says: "New York was the battle ground of the Presidential election. Its electoral vote will make Gen. Harrison President. The State contains one-tenth of the population and an equal share of the wealth of the Union. Its metropolis is the financial and business centre of the country. At this port 80 per cent of the foreign trade is handled. Why is the Empire State—the State of Evarts, Hiscock, Platt and Miller—to be given a back seat, or none at all, in the new administration?"

These truths, so well expressed by the World, have impressed themselves on Gen. Harrison. He has been reading history and observing events. He has especially read the career of Grover Cleveland. He has learned that when Cleveland came to form his Cabinet he made Mr. Manning, of New York, Secretary of the Treasury, and Mr. Whitney, of New York, Secretary of the Navy. That, subsequently, when Mr. Manning resigned the Secretaryship of the Treasury, President Cleveland appointed, as his successor, Mr. Fairchild, of New York. Perhaps the records of the Treasury and Navy Department give evidence of the wisdom of these appointments, but what has become of Cleveland? The World says: "Seven times in succession the Democrats have carried New York. This year they elected every candidate on their State ticket, and lost the Presidency, simply through a defection from their National candidate." If this showing does no

drive Harrison from all thought of giving New York a front seat in his Cabinet, what can?

Taking it for granted that Blaine, Wanamaker and Alger have received "portfolios," a very serious defect in General Harrison is indicated,—and that is, an utter disregard of high moral character in the members of his Cabinet. Blaine is an intellectual giant, but he is "the tattooed man." Wanamaker is a man of great business sagacity; but he gave a hundred thousand dollars to "the corruption fund" of his party. Alger is an intelligent, vigorous and thriving lumberman; but, he sent his "barrel" to buy "floaters in blocks of fire."

Mr. Harrison should respect the moral sense of the country, and call to his remembrance the inspired declaration, "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people."

**THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.**

**EIGHTEENTH DAY.**

**SENATE.**

The Senate was called to order by Lt. Gov. Holt.

Prayer by Rev. J. H. Cordon, of this city.

Mr. Campbell lodged a motion to reconsider the vote by which S. B. 89 yesterday passed its third reading. Mr. Campbell was also permitted to withdraw two bills introduced by himself.

A bill to increase the pay of jurors in Craven county was tabled upon a call of the roll—yes 12, noes 12.

**SPECIAL ORDER.**

The bill of Mr. Williams, of Pitt, to prevent the buying and selling of futures, being special order for 11:30, was recommitted to the committee on agriculture, mechanics, mines and mining, at the request of the author.

Mr. Payne's bill authorizing justices of the peace to issue process in certain cases based upon contracts, to other counties than their own.

Mr. Pon wished to amend so that if plaintiff fails to obtain judgment, and the defendant have judgment for damages and costs he shall also be allowed mileage as are witnesses in the Superior Court. Amendment accepted.

Mr. Blair feared the operations of the bill and thought cautious action was necessary. He thought it best to let well enough alone.

Mr. Thomas said "we farmers" will get the blame for all such legislation. He said England once had a farmers' Parliament, like this farmers' Legislature, and he believed it was to this day called "The Fools' Parliament."

The amendment of Mr. Turner, of Iredell, that suits under the bill shall not apply to amounts less than one hundred dollars was adopted. Upon a call of the roll the bill failed to pass its third reading—yes 4, noes 33.

S. B. 146, Mr. Williams, of Pitt, in relation to indigent and other apprentices, was taken up, and after two or three minor amendments had been attached, passed its second and third readings. This bill provides that indigent children shall be indentured in the name of the clerk of the Superior Court of the county where they reside. Those who come within the meaning of the act for being apprenticed, are: First, all orphans whose estates are of such small value that no person will educate and maintain them for the benefit thereof; second, all infants whose fathers have deserted their families and been absent six months, leaving them without sufficient support; third, any poor child who is or may be chargeable to the county, or shall beg alms; fourth, any child who has no father and whose mother is of bad character, or suffers her children to grow up in habits of idleness without any visible means of obtaining an honest livelihood; fifth, all infants whose parents do not habitually employ their time in some honest, industrious employment.

H. B. 149, S. B. 140, amending the code in relation to auctioneers, permitting county commissioners to regulate bonds at sums not less than \$500, and S. B. 249, to satisfy certain claims against the University of North Carolina, passed their second and third readings.

**HOUSE.**

The House was called to order at 10 o'clock, Speaker Leazar in the chair.

The committee on corporations reported favorably H. B. 351, amending the charter of the Bogue & Albemarle Railroad Company.

**BILLS INTRODUCED.**

Relating to justices of the peace; incorporating the Atlantic & Baltimore Railroad Company; for the better protection of the schools

and colleges of the State, (this bill prevents the living, within a certain distance of the institutions suggested, of females of disreputable character); repealing certain laws regarding the tax on fertilizers.

**CALENDAR—PASSED THIRD READING.**

H. B. 310, relating to discharge of defendants in criminal cases for want of sufficient evidence; S. B. 114, regarding the fees of referees, (said fees shall be taxed to either party); H. B. 356, enlarging the fees of pilots of Bogue Inlet; S. B. 119, protecting telegrams and letters—making it a misdemeanor for any person to open a letter or telegram and read the same knowing it to be private; H. B. 476, punishing resistance to public officers.
