**RACE ISSUES.**

The race issue is being widely discussed. We do not propose to throw any new light on the "unsolved problem." History and experience teach us that in all conflicts the weaker must go to the wall. The only way for them to exist and enjoy the common comforts of life, is for them to so live as not to obstruct the progress of the more powerful.

In America the white man has dominated in the past, controls at present, and will govern in the future.

As Governor Lee said the other day, the whites and the blacks can never assimilate, and negro control of State Governments will not be tolerated. The Governor is further credited with having said: "The new Administration should appoint respectable men to Federal offices. Give the South talent and parity in the United States Courts, which will administer justice, and not merely carpet bag politicians. General Harrison should discontinue the old policy of irritating the colored man in order to use him for merely party purposes; leave the negro to learn something useful; permit him to share in the general prosperity by cultivating conditions that will insure him profitable employment. If the negro is misled and made troublesome, so much the worse for him."

These views are eminently sound. The people of the South, and especially the Democracy of the South, ardently desire fairness, equity and concord. Every man shall have his rights at the hands of the sovereign people of these States. Not a hair of any man shall fall to the ground until justice has so decreed. If the bond is forfeited they will exact the pound of flesh, but will not take one drop of blood. The scales shall be so evenly held that the dust of the balance will be weighed even to the hundredth part of a grain. There shall be, on our part, nothing to hinder or make afraid in all this broad land.

It is possible to imagine a condition of affairs that would call for the interposition of Federal authority, but before that condition can exist the new Administration must violate every principle of political philosophy, and every sentiment of honor and justice. Is General Harrison prepared for this? Then, he is a madman, and the people of the United States will not brook his control. But Harrison is no madman, and the North and the South will be treated as a great country, moving on to the fulfillment of a grand destiny.

The question of domination is fixed. Fixed by the Eternal. England, Germany, France, Russia, America, and every land beneath the sun, attest and proclaim the eternal supremacy of the white man.

In the South the negro may enjoy all that he is competent to enjoy. The common blessings of life are his in all their fullness, and in the sphere that heaven has ordained, he may gain honors, acquire fortune, and play up treasures where rust doth not cor-

rupt nor thieves break through and steal.

We cannot better close this article than by inserting here a paragraph from a late speech of Bieme, of Virginia, which is alike applicable to all the States of the South:

"Democrats must agree for the time to lay aside all other issues and stand solidly, unanimously in defense of that great vital principle, the rule of the honest thrift and common sense of Virginia. We must preserve our local self-government, intelligently and honestly conducted. We must preserve it in accordance with our constitutional rights. We must defend it against the machinations of its time-serving enemies—State and Federal—guarding it sacredly against the lawless hands of internal foes and against the unlawful schemes of arrogant political invaders. Virginia must be ruled by the people of Virginia. Her honest, patriotic people must guard her elections. Her right of local self-government shall not be wrested from her by the plots of the Sher-mans, the Forakers, the Chandlers, and other implacable South haters in remote States. The remaining rights of the States shall not be purloined from them by the cunning devices of sectional partisans. Republican schemers must not succeed under the false pretense of preserving the purity of the ballot and securing a free suffrage, only in throwing a protective arm around a class of fraudulent voters—minors, disfranchised, repeaters—whose individuality is indistinct and whose identity is obscured by such a veil of darkness as can only be successfully penetrated by the most rigid and persistent investigation."

**THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY**

3RD DAY. SENATE.

The Senate was called to order by Lt. Gov. Holt.

Prayer by Rev. J. L. Foster, of this city.

The following bills passed their third readings: To allow clerk superior court of Richmond county to be absent from his office 1st and 2d Mondays in March; repealing chapter 270 laws 1887 in relation to sale of liquor near Cape Hatteras Camp Ground.

**SPECIAL ORDER.**

S. B. 6, reducing the legal rate of interest to six per cent, was taken up on its second reading and upon a call of the yeas and nays passed its second reading, yeas 32, nays 4.

Senator Williams, author of the above bill, in a most eloquent manner explained the necessity of such action. His whole soul seemed to be infused with the spirit of assistance to that class poor, hard working farmers and laboring men who were often compelled to borrow money to feed their little ones and save the home. He had given the matter careful thought and was not in any way alarmed at the cry made that if the rate of interest was reduced all the money would leave North Carolina. He was in earnest and could say that he did not see the faces of those Senators who voted against such a bill two years ago now in the Senate. They had been laid on the shelf. His argument was sound, to the point, conclusive and made in such earnestness that its weight had influence with the Senate.

In response to a telegram from Mr. Washington Bryan, president of the A. & N. C. R. R. Co., asking what day the General Assembly would attend the Eastern Carolina Oyster, Fish and Game Fair, Mr. Kerr introduced the following resolution: Resolved, by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring, that the General Assembly attend the Eastern Carolina Oyster, Fish and Game Fair in a body at a day and time to be fixed by a committee of three on the part of the Senate and four on the part of the House of Representatives, which resolution was adopted.

**HOUSE.**

At 3 p. m. the Speaker rapped, and said "the House will come to order." Prayer was offered by the Rev. J. L. Foster, of the Christian Church.

Mr. F. F. Green, the newly seated member from Jones county, being present was sworn in.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEES.**

Propositions and grievances favorably, S. R. 262, asking members of Congress to use their efforts in relation to the improvement of Neuse river; H. B. 438, relating to burning woods in Pamlico county. Judiciary—H. B. 206, relating to swamp lands; H. B. 539, relating to the practice of medicine; H. B. 352, allowing Vance county the right to elect its own representative. Education—H. B. 258, enabling school districts to levy additional taxation for school purposes, unfavorably.

**BILLS INTRODUCED.**

Mr. Hampton, to compel persons

in Albemarle Sound to set nets in a north and south direction; to exempt Mitchell county from the law relating to county government and to provide for the election of county officers by the people; to promote improvement in shell fish in the waters of the State.

**PASSED THIRD READING.**

H. B. 301, incorporating Hatteras Camp Ground (making it unlawful to sell refreshments or take photographs in Hatteras Circuit during the camp meeting exercises.)

H. B. 318, amending the public school law, was taken up, and upon motion of Mr. Doughton, the House went into committee of the whole for the consideration of the bill, which was presented by the educational committee of the two houses. Mr. Lyon, as chairman of the committee, took the chair. Section after section was adopted until No. 15 was reached, when a minor change was made relating to sites and locations. Other sections were adopted to 26. Sections 26 and 27 were stricken out and a substitute adopted which provides that the law shall remain as it is; that the county treasurer and not the county superintendent shall be treasurer to the county board of education. Other sections to 34 were adopted. Section 34 was amended by inserting "wilfully or wrongfully" after "shall," in the sentence "any person who shall misapply or cause to be misapplied any money set apart by law for schools." The remaining sections were adopted without change.

Much time was taken up in the consideration of the bill. The committee of the whole then made its report to the House and the report was received, after which Mr. Alexander moved to meet every day hereafter except Monday at 10 o'clock. Carried.

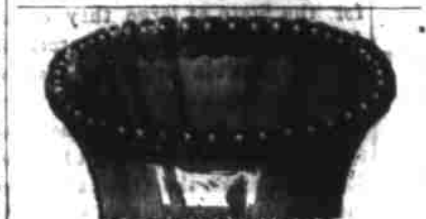
