The Directors of the Fair Association and our people generally thought it appropriate and proper that the General Assembly should be invited to the Fair, not to a fishing frolic, in order that they might see and learn something of our resources and industries, and possibly gain some information as to what we need in the way of legislation.

Senators Kerr and Means took an intelligent view of the matter and we are glad to know that a large number of Senators will be with us.

## Gov. Lee's Private Secretary Commits Suicide.

RICHMOND, VA., Feb. 7.-The Governor's private secretary, James E. Waller, committed suicide last night at 12 o'clock, by shooting himself in the right ear. He was found this morning at 7 by Mr. Jones. Cause unknown.

About 4 o'clock yesterday the elevator man, knowing that Capt. Waller was in his office, requested the janitor to tell him that he was about to make his last trip. The janitor went to the office but did not see the captain. His hat and overcoat were on a chair, and the door connecting his office with the Governor's was locked. Thinking that Capt. Waller was attending to important business in the Governor's office he concluded not to interrupt him. About 5 o'clock deceased called up his friend Wm. Daniel by telephone and asked him if he could come up to his office as he wanted to see him on important business. Daniel told him he could not come just then. Capt. Waller then said, "All right, I will see you at supper." This was the last heard of him alive. Governor Lee can assign no reason for the terrible act. Deceased left nothing to indicate what caused him to commit the deed. It is thought by friends that the act was the result of a love affair. He was known to be subject to periods of melancholy.

Fifty two Lives Lost on the Steamer Glenora.

LONDON, Feb. 7.-It has been asserted beyond doubt that the steamer which was sunk in collision with the British bark Largo Bay of Beachy Head on Monday night, was the Glenora. The Glenora was bound from Liverpool to London. She carried a crew numbering fifty four men, all of whom were presumably drowned. She had no passengers. She was last reported as having passed Plover Point Monday. The Glenora was a three-masted iron screw steamer of 1,200 tons. She was built at Glasgow in 1878, and was rated 100 A1 at the British Lloyd's.

The force of the collision was so great that the fore-mast of the Largo Bay was jerked out and fell across her deckhouse, crushing it. A wild tempest was raging at the time of the accident and snow was falling so thickly that it was impossible for the lookout on either vessel to see the lights of the other until the collision was inevitable. The Glenora forged ahead trying to cross the Largo Bay's bow, but failed to do so, and ran at full speed into the bark, demolishing ten feet of her bow. The Largo Bay could have sunk had she not been protected with water tight sections. The surface of the ship dazed the crew of the bark. They saw nothing further of the steamer, but could make out her masts struggling in the water. It was impossible, however, to render them any assistance, all of the Largo Bay's boats being smashed. The wind blew with such force that the sails of the bark were torn to shreds, and a boy was carried overboard. The bark weathered the storm until rescued and towed into Cowes.
