**THE SENATE AND THE PRESIDENT.**

Time was when the American Senate was the most august body on earth. Then it was the representative of independent States and the glory of the Union. Now it is the impregnable fortress of monopoly and the strong tower of plutocracy. Once it afforded an arena on which dignity and courtesy were most signally displayed. Now it is the theatre for the exhibition of malignant passions and the sharp practice of designing politicians.

Stiff there are Senators of high renown, splendid ability and incorruptible integrity. Among these are Vance and Ransom of North Carolina.

But our object this morning is to contrast the conduct of the Senate with that of the President as illustrative of the spirit of Democracy and the spirit of Republicanism.

Mr. Cleveland has been careful not to embarrass the Harrison Administration. No appointments have been made but such as are essential to the public welfare.

In strong contrast with this honorable course is the disreputable conduct of the Senate in refusing to confirm nominations to fill vacancies occurring in the regular course of the Government's business.

The theory of the Republican Senators is that since November the offices belong to them; that when vacancies occur business is not to be considered, but only their own claims to patronage.

This clearly establishes the fact that the Democratic party is the party of patriotism, and the Republican party is the party of plunder and spoil, irrespective of the public good or national honor.

The time has come when it is more honorable to a defeated Democrat than a successful Republican.

training school for females only, much discussion took place and the amendment upon a call of the roll was lost—ayes 17, noes 28. Mr. Barber's last amendment providing that the training school should be located as near the geographical centre of the State as possible, upon a call of the roll was lost—ayes 12, noes 28. Mr. Campbell moved to reconsider the vote by which the amendment of Mr. Turner of Iredell that "the school shall not be located in any town of more than 3,000 inhabitants" was adopted yesterday. The vote on the motion to reconsider being a tie the president voted to reconsider. The question recurring upon the adoption of Mr. Turner's amendment, upon a call of the roll the amendment was lost—ayes 20, noes 24. Mr. Blair moved to amend by striking out section 4 and inserting "the school shall be located at the University and its teachers shall be a part of the faculty of that institution." Upon a call of the roll this amendment was lost, ayes 7, noes 33. Another amendment to strike out "\$5,000" and insert "\$1,000," upon a call of the roll was also lost, ayes 10, noes 29. On the third reading of the original bill, upon a call of the roll, it passed, ayes 28, noes 11. Those voting for the bill were Messrs. Abbott, Aycock, Bennett, Brock, Campbell, Copeland, Emry, Falkner, Kerr, Leeper, LeGrand, Lineback, Little, Long, Lucas, Means, Payne, Reid, Rice, Shaw, Thomas, Twitty, Walters and White.

Those who voted against the bill were Messrs. Barber, Blair, Briggs, Farthing, King, Lusk, Moore, Robinson, Sills, Smith and Turner, of Iredell.

Not voting: Messrs. Bailey, Banks, Brown, Green, Crawford, Hampton, Holton, Hughes, Potts, Turner, of Catawba, and Williams, of Cumberland.

**HOUSE.**

The House was called to order at 10 o'clock by the Speaker. A resolution was introduced that the legislature adjourn on March 11th, 1889. Placed upon the calendar.

The unfinished business of Monday was called up, the consideration of H. B. 760, to provide an alternative method of working the public roads of the State. The bill allows each county to keep up its roads by taxation, giving to the county commissioners and magistrates the power to levy a special tax for this purpose.

The bill created considerable discussion pro and con. Upon a call of the yeas and nays the bill passed its second reading by a vote of 72 to 24.

**PASSED THIRD READINGS.**

H. B. 545, relating to working convicts on the C. F. & Y. V. R. R. (This bill returns the \$101,000 worth of bonds in the hands of the State Treasurer which were placed as security for the completion of the road. The State furnished convicts for the prosecution of the work. The policy now being not to furnish convicts, the act is to bring about a settlement. The company agrees to the repeal of laws assigning convicts and the State returns the securities of the company); H. B. 140, to prohibit non-residents from dredging oysters in the waters of the State; H. B. 810, for the relief of A. C. Hill, Lenoir county; H. B. 815, amending the pilot law of Hatteras Inlet; H. B. 800, authorizing commissioners of Hyde county to levy a special tax; H. B. 843, concerning county prisoners (prohibiting the convict garb being worn unless guilty of certain crimes).

**Salt as a Medicine.**

We are very apt to seek some far-fetched cure for our bodily ailments, and to overlook the simpler remedies, quite as effective it may be, which are to be found even in the humblest household.

Common salt is one of the specifics for various diseases, which many lose the benefit of because they are not aware of its value. For sore or inflamed eyes, wash them in a weak solution of salt and warm water. This is also useful to remove the inflammation caused by extraneous substances in the eye.

For sore throat and a hacking cough, take one salt-spoonful of salt, two teaspoonfuls of vinegar, to half a goblet of cold water (iced water preferable); sip this frequently and relief will be felt at once. This same preparation will remove nausea, and settle the weakest stomach. It is also beneficial in attacks of colic.

Nothing is more useful in sickness than a small flannel bag filled with salt. For toothache, colic, or any disease requiring warm applications, it is invaluable, as it retains its heat a long time; and it is greatly to be preferred to hot, wet emollients, which soon get cold and uncomfortable. The bag and all can be put on a tin pan and warmed in the oven; but it is better to rip a small hole in the bag, and empty the salt out into the pan to heat. After it is hot it can be put back with a large spoon, and the hole sewed up in a moment.

A teaspoonful of salt, dissolved in water, and taken every hour or two, beginning six or eight hours before a chill, will often prevent it, in intermittent, or what is known as "chills and fever."

**The Deadly Cigarette.**

During a discussion in the American Association, Professor W. S. Dudley described some experiments which he had made on the injurious effects of cigarette smoking. He showed that they were principally due to the manner of smoking and not to the impurities, as is currently supposed. In smoking cigarettes, to get the desired effect the smoke is inhaled, that is to say, it is breathed into the lungs; whereas, in smoking pipes and cigars, the smoke is simply drawn into the mouth and then expelled.

In experiments on small animals, in which they were caused to breathe air containing cigarette smoke, it was found that, after a mouse had smoked one and a fourth cigarette, life was extinct. Examination of blood showed that it had died from the effects of the carbon monoxide which was contained in the smoke, and not from the nicotine and other volatile products of the tobacco and paper.
