THE Goldsboro Transcript Messenger has returned home after a long absence and is happy in the cordial welcome extended by many friends.

SEVERAL distinct earthquake shocks were experienced in Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland on the 8th inst., but no damage resulted.

Two gay lads, W. C. White and H. C. Starkey, of Lexington, Va., became offended because the music of one was offensive to the other, and decided to settle the affair with pistols. Forty-two shots were fired without getting a feather.

THE Governor has again honored New Berne, and done valuable service to the State, by appointing Charles C. Clark, Esq., one of the Directors of the Penitentiary. There is no position in the State that Mr. Clark would not adorn and magnify.

AN exchange says: "Members of the G. O. P. who continued to hold office under a Democratic administration have kept away from Republican clubs for four years. Since March 4th various Republican clubs have been thronged every evening by men who sit at desks in the custom house and postoffice."

CELIA LOGAN has written a novel entitled "Her Strange Fate," which Belford, Clarke & Co. have in press and will issue in a few days. It is said to be thrillingly dramatic in plot and action, without descending to the level of mere sensationalism. The name of the authoress is a sufficient guarantee of the literary excellence of the work.

THE Canadian Parliament is playing "Sweet Home" for the boodlers, and it nearly runs them crazy. They don't want to go home in the morning, but if the Weldon bill passes—and the chances are all that way—they will all be bounced over the borders to the music of "Home again from a foreign shore."

GENERAL W. R. COX, than whom North Carolina had no more gallant soldier, has signified his purpose to be at New Berne on the 10th of May. His regiment, composed in part of companies from Craven county, bore a conspicuous and honorable part in the battle of Chancellorsville, and his presence here on Memorial Day will add very much to the occasion.

THERE is danger of a conflict of arms between the Union and Northern Pacific Railroad Companies for the possession of Jefferson Canyon, Montana. Three hundred employees of the Union Pacific road, under the captaincy of Kenna, left Battle Wednesday armed with Winchester rifles. About an equal number of Northern Pacific men have started from Helena, and it is certain that there will be trouble over the possession of the canyon.

A SPECIAL to the N. Y. World from Charleston, S. C., says: "For the sixth or eighth time Robert T. Jones, the murderer of the three Pressleys in Edgefield county, has been brought to trial. On each occasion it has been impossible to convict Jones of one of the most outrageous crimes on record. During the evidence yesterday it was developed that several members of the jury spent the previous night in Jones's cell playing cards, and that many of the jury boarded in the jail. This case has cost the State many thousand dollars."

Mr. John Vaughn's Injuries Prove Fatal.

The serious accident related in the JOURNAL yesterday proved to be a fatal one and Mr. John Vaughn died about 1 p. m., not quite twenty-four hours after the accident. Upon further examination yesterday it was discovered that two or three ribs were broken and that he was severely injured internally. The physicians held a consultation yesterday morning and decided that the only possible hope of saving the life of the unfortunate man was in the amputation of the right arm, and in this there was only one chance in a thousand. The amputation was made and death followed in a short while.

Mr. Vaughn was a faithful employe at the fertilizer factory. He leaves a wife and two children, a grown son and a little daughter, who have the sympathy of the entire community in their sad bereavement.

Railroad to Onslow.

The Argus is urging the people of Goldsboro to build a railroad into Onslow county. If there is any county or town in the State able to subscribe to and build a railroad that county is Wayne and the town Goldsboro. They have, without incurring one dollar of indebtedness, secured about as good railroad facilities as any town or county in the State, and are now in condition to pay for additional railroads. It would pay Goldsboro and Wayne county handsomely to build a railroad to Onslow, but it would not pay Onslow to aid in the construction of such a road because for a less outlay a road can be constructed to New Berne and the people of that county will then have the advantage of both water and railroad transportation.

An amendment to the charter of the East Carolina Land & Railway Company was passed by the General Assembly which is a long step in the direction of building a road from New Berne to Onslow, and if the people of New Berne will but take hold of the matter and help to push it through, the road will be built.

Our people seem to be perfectly quiet while roads are being surveyed from every direction into Onslow county. The natural markets for the people of this county are New Berne and Wilmington. Of course Kinston, Goldsboro or any other town that has energy and push sufficient to build a road and get there first will carry the trade of the county.

Onslow county's great need is a railroad from New Berne to Wilmington. Such a road will open to the varied products of that rich county two good markets and give the people cheap freight. Such a road will also be of vast benefit to both New Berne and Wilmington and ought to be built at once.

A General Strike of Weavers.

FALL RIVER, MASS., March 11.—The weavers' strike for an advance in wages which occurred this morning is one of the most general in the history of labor troubles. The weaving departments of this city are practically shut down and 6,000 weavers are idle. Those who refuse to strike do not number more than half enough to keep one mill going. The board of trade says, however, that no advance will be given and a bitter struggle is anticipated.
