MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW BERNE, N. C., May 7, 1889. To the Honorable Board of Councilmen Gentlemen-It becomes my duty to ransmit to you the report of the various transmit to you the report of the various departments of our city government for the fiscal year ending April 30th, 1889, accompanied herewith in detail, with such suggestions as seem to me worthy of your consideration.

Before reviewing our municipal affairs it is proper that I should congratulate you, and through you, our community for their deliverance from the scourse that visited during the

the scourge that visited during the year our more unfortunate Southern

THE SANITARY CONDITION of our city is a subject that demands

your serious study and upon you de-volves the important duty of adopting the most thorough hygienic measures. FINANCE. The report of our capable Treasurer

and Finance Committee contains complete information in regard to the financial condition of our city.

WATER SUPPLY. I cannot too earnestly urge upon you the great necessity of improving the quality of the water furnished for domestic purposes. It has been somewhat improved of late years by the system of bored wells, but they cannot be made what they should without sufficient appropriation to cement the curbing. The supply for fire purposes is adequate.

FIRE DEPARTMENT:

Our fire department is composed of the very best material that New Berne can furnish, and has attained an efficiency unsurpassed by any similar organization in the Union, and is the pride of the city. I recommend that the chief sugmeer of the department be requested to furnish annually a detailed report of the number of fires, and the amount of losses sustained, with the amount of insurance.

The total number of arrests during the year ending April 20th, 1889, was 200, of which 50 were whites and 179 colored. The present number of police officers is inadequate for the proper protection of the lives and property of our citizens. A large portion of the city is practically unguarded, and there about be an increase of the force. I am pleased to announce that there has not been a single instance where any officer has been reproved or suspended during the year. The total number of arrests during

ecelved and adopted. I have made 19 arrests during the month; all convicted. Four worked time out and one appealed to court. Fines collected, \$18.00; costs, \$25.30. Total, \$44.30.

One-half the above costs, \$18.15, was deducted for my fees.
