**Shipping News.**  
The schooner Centennial, of Great Egg Harbor, Penn., was transferring a cargo of coal to the A. & N. C. cars yesterday for H. Weil & Bro., Goldsboro. The schooner Addie Henry, Capt. Joe Smith, arrived from Elizabeth City, light, on Monday morning.

The steamer Newberne of the O. D. line will leave today at 9 o'clock for Norfolk. Truck received up to the hour of sailing. The Manteo of this line will arrive tonight and sail Friday at 3 p. m.

The steamer Stout of the Clyde line arrived from Baltimore yesterday morning with a cargo of merchandise and left this morning on return trip with a cargo of lumber and naval stores.

The steamer Annie of the E. C. D. line sailed yesterday with cargo of lumber and truck. The Eagle of this line will sail today at 4 o'clock.

The steamer Taboma will arrive tonight and sail at 6 o'clock Thursday morning.

## New Berne Schools.

The commencement season of schools and colleges is at hand, and from every direction, almost from every town and village in the State, comes the news of the closing exercises of some flourishing school, academy or college. In many of these New Berne and this immediate section aid in furnishing talent to advertise and bring into prominence these schools and colleges, while our own time-honored Academy stands on the beautiful Green, deserted and desolate. We receive almost daily programs for the closing exercises of schools in our own section of the State, but also for New Berne, nothing of the sort ruffles her quiet repose between the Neuse and the Trent. How the JOURNAL would rejoice to publish a full program of the closing exercises of a large and prosperous school of high grade in this dear old town! How delighted we would be to attend these exercises and tell all our readers in the adjoining counties of the excellent work done at the old New Berne Academy. But instead of this we must watch the papers to see what New Berne boys and girls are doing at other schools.

Citizens of New Berne, our schools are not what we ought to have, and we ought not to be content until there is an improvement and a great improvement. Children are being sent to school from New Berne at a cost of several thousand dollars annually when they ought to be attending school right here at home. Instead of sending our young men and young ladies off for three or four years to be educated, we ought to keep them home and draw others from abroad. In a healthy place like New Berne where board can be obtained at very low rates there is no reason why pupils should go from our midst and all around us to distant schools, and they would not go if we had such a school in New Berne as we need—a school that will draw many of our citizens who have children to educate will readily acknowledge that this is true, but what are they going to do about it? If there is anything in which a community must cooperate in order to succeed it is that of education. To build up and sustain a first-class school of high grade in our midst there must be co-operation. We need co-operation in New Berne for this purpose; we need it bad; we need it right now; prompt, vigorous action should be taken at once to have a school open here next fall that will not only command the support of our home people but will draw from our neighboring counties.

In order to inaugurate this measure in time we suggest that a number of our citizens who have children to educate confer with the board of trustees of the New Berne Academy at their meeting next Friday with a view of renting or leasing for a term of years one of the buildings on the Academy Green. After the building has been secured steps can be taken to obtain teachers. The Trustees can well afford to rent or lease one of their buildings as it is not at all probable that the public school funds for several years to come will justify them in employing teachers for both buildings.

We simply throw out this as a suggestion because we see and feel the necessity of building up a good school in this city.

**The Superior Court.**  
Court convened yesterday morning at ten o'clock.

The grand jury was drawn and J. H. Hunter was sworn as foreman.

His Honor's charge was very explicit as to the laws which are more frequently violated, and the jurors were impressed with the responsible position which they held as a part of the court.

The State docket was called and cases noted for trial.

H. L. Gibbs, Esq., was introduced to the court by Hon. C. C. Clark as having obtained license to practice law and was sworn, Mr. Clark administering the oath.

In the afternoon session only one jury case was tried, a case of larceny, in which a verdict was found for the defendant.

## Mayor's Court.

Lizzie Moulton, white, had expressed her sentiments in a boisterous manner on the streets, using language that was calculated to corrupt the morals of unfortunate hearers. She was therefore brought to answer the charge of violating the city ordinance. She pleaded guilty and was fined \$3.00 and cost, or 15 days on the streets or leave the city for twelve months. Lizzie said she would skip the next morning.

Tob Gilman, colored, said he was guilty of disorderly conduct on the streets and was let off on payment of cost.

Warren Albritton, colored, had raised a rumpus near the market on Saturday afternoon. He pleaded guilty and was excused on payment of \$5.00 and cost. Court adjourned.
