Our Fire Department, .

As there is sometimes complaint about the extravagant expenditures of our fire department, and as some have gone so far as to suggest that a paid department ond, \$375 per annum. would be less expensive, we publish in this issue an article from the Wilmington Star showing the cost of the paid department of Richmond, Va. and the volunteer department of Wilmington. It will be seen that the number of engines, hook and ladder and hose reel men \$15 each per month. The average cost of all other expenses for each encompanies are noted in both departments and that the volunteer department of Wilmington which is just as olded to picnic as Wilkinson's Point efficient as the Richmond, but not so large by half, cost a little over \$10,000 per year, while the latter city is over

> There is no finer fruit to can than the huckleberries that grow spontaneously in our pocosins and savannahs. It costs nothing but the picking to get them, yet how few of our farmers take the trouble to can and save them. When they get so they will look after such little matters like these and take care of what is made instead of trying td do sverything on a big scale, they will be independent of trusts, combines and mortgages.

Volunteer vs. Paid Fire Departments. The cost of a part-paid fire department as compared with the cost of a volunteer department, such as Wilmington has, is shown by the follow-

ing:
The fire department of the city of Richmond, Va., which may be taken as a fair sample of the partly paid system, costs in round numbers \$65,426 per annum. Capt. Puller, chief of the de partment, in a report recently furnished says that Richmond has six steam fire engine companies, two hook and ladder companies, one horse-hose reel company, one hand reel company, one small hook and ladder truck, and 15,000 feet of hose in number one condition.

The chief engineer has entire control of the department at all times, giving it his sole attention, for which he receives \$1,500 per annum, and equipments furnished. He has two assistants whose services are only required at fires and who receive-first assistant, \$400; soc-

plument of one engineer, on duty at all times, at \$81 per month, one fireman \$68,42, one driver for engine, \$68,42, one driver for hose cart, \$68,43, one helper, \$68.43. The foreman and nine call-men who live at home and report to all alarms, are paid—foreman \$20.83, gine for twelve months is \$904; making an aggregate of \$5,209.08 for each engine per annum. Each hook and ladder company has a

complement of one driver at \$68.42 per month, one tillerman \$68.43 per month, one foreman \$20,83, eleven call men, who respend to all alarms and drill once a week but live at home, \$15 each per month. All other expenses \$482 per mnnm, and aggregate, \$4,352.24 for

each company.

Each hose reel company has on duty at all times, one driver at \$68.43 per month and one helper at \$68.49. A foreman at \$30.48 and nine call men at
