Some plan in this line might be wrought out by the Trustees, who are selected from our best citizens, and are vitally interested themselves. In the approaching Assembly of North Caro-lina teachers at Morehead there doubtless can be found some live and able educator, whose services can be ob-tained. Is it not worth a trial ?
