NORTH CAROLINA NEWS.

From the State Papers.

Tobacco Plant: Mr. W. H. Hester shows heads of wheat, taken from his field in Orange county, with six grains to the "sheaf." This is an unusually prolific yield. Mr. Hester says the wheat crops generally are good in his neighborhood.

Winston Republican: The Wilkesboro execution force while digging through one of the young mountains near Elkin, Surry county, struck a rattlesnake dead the past week that made them move around lively. Some fifteen good sized rattlers were killed and about as many more made their escape through the bushes.

Goldboro Argus: In an affray at Santa X Roads, in the upper eastern section of this county, Wednesday afternoon, C. C. Gardner, a white man, commonly known as "Lum" Gardner, who figured notoriously in our courts here some years ago and who has been "down South" since, up to recently, struck Frank McKee, another white man, on the head with an axe from which blow the latter died within a few hours.

News and Observer: The Trinity College subscription committee was out on the way path in full force, yesterday afternoon, and was fairly making things happen. The committee subdivided the territory, taking in the whole city in a systematic way. One party reported \$2,000 last night as the result of a few hours work. Another reported over \$1,000, and the total was last night estimated at \$15,000. Almost every man who was seen chipped in without a word.

Wilmington Messenger: We exceedingly regret to chronicle the death of Captain James D. Gardner, which event occurred yesterday morning at his residence at 204 North Sixth street. The deceased was well known for many years as a conductor on the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, and later on the Carolina Central. Guests sitting on the piazza of the Hotel Oceanian at Carolina Beach on Wednesday saw a rare sight: It was a waterspout which seemed to be about three miles off the coast in front of the hotel. It appeared to be several feet in diameter, and continued to whirl in the air for ten or fifteen minutes.

Charlotte Democrat: Mr. Pearson has left Greensboro for his home at Asheville. His work there resulted in much good, there having been over four hundred conversions. Twelve hundred and twenty-five dollars were raised toward the erection of a Y. M. C. A. hall.—Mr. Jno. Farrior, the Charlotte jeweler who sometimes since lost about \$4,500 worth of goods, had a telegram from Cleveland, Tenn., purporting to give the whereabouts of the stolen property and advising him of the surveillance of the suspect. In company with Sergeant Jetton, Mr. Farrior repaired to Cleveland, but on his arrival found himself hoaxed. There was no such party to be found as the signer of the telegram.

Statesville Landmark: They had a big mad dog sensation in Yadkin week before last. A dog believed to be mad bit a person at Nebo, another at Booneville, and tore the flesh off the arm of the jailer's wife at Yadkinville. It bit many dogs, also, and was finally killed. The persons bitten sought the madstones.—The wheat harvest is in progress this week. Some wheat was cut in south Iredell the first of last week. The first harvested in this immediate vicinity was by J. C. Bickett, colored, Saturday last, the last. He brought a number of finely headed stalks to this office. After all the reports of various kinds the harvest will prove that the feed wheat crop is unusually full this year.—A colored infant which had evidently lived but which had never been dressed, was taken out of a well on the placod of Messrs. Wootten and Burnett, a short distance east of town, the latter part of last week. Coroner Clegg summoned a jury and held an inquest, but without satisfactory results.

CITY ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of City Councilmen of the city of New Bern, N. C.:

Sec. 1. That no person or corporation shall store in one place within the corporate limits of the city of New Bern at one time for a term longer than forty-eight hours, more than two barrels of petroleum, kerosene, naphtha or gasoline.

Sec. 2. That any person or corporation guilty of a violation of this ordinance shall pay a fine of twenty-five dollars. That each day said quantity or oil shall remain in one place shall constitute a violation of this ordinance. Provided, that this ordinance shall not be enforced within ten days after the passage of the same.

CENSUS OFFICE.
Washington, D. C., May 1, 1889.

TO THE MEDICAL PROFESSION:
The various medical associations and the medical profession will be glad to learn that Dr. John S. Billings, Surgeon U. S. Army, has consented to take charge of the Report on the Mortality and Vital Statistics of the United States as returned by the Eleventh Census.

As the United States has no system of registration of vital statistics, such as is relied upon by other civilized nations for the purpose of ascertaining the actual movement of population, our census affords the only opportunity of obtaining near an approximate estimate of the birth and death rates of much the larger part of the country, which is entirely unprovided with any satisfactory system of State and municipal registration.

In view of this, the Census Office, during the month of May this year, will issue to the medical profession throughout the country "Physician's Registers" for the purpose of obtaining more accurate returns of death than it is possible for the enumerators to make. It is earnestly hoped that physicians in every part of the country will co-operate with the Census Office in this important work. The records should be kept from June 1, 1889, to May 31, 1890. Nearly 30,000 of these registration books were filled up and returned to the office in 1880, and nearly all of them used for statistical purposes. It is hoped that double this number will be obtained for the Eleventh Census.

Physicians not receiving Registers can obtain them by sending their names and addresses to the Census Office, and with the Register, an official envelope which requires no stamp will be provided for their return to Washington.

If all medical men in the country will lend their aid, the mortality and vital statistics of the Eleventh Census will be more comprehensive and complete than they have ever been. Every physician should take a personal pride in having their records so far and so wide as it is possible to make them.

Application to Amend the Charter of the Neuse and Trent River Steamboat Company.

Notice is hereby given that an application will be made by the President and Board of Directors of said Company, before the Clerk of the Superior Court of Craven County, on the 15th day of July, 1889, at 12 o'clock, M., to amend the charter of the said Neuse and Trent River Company, in the following particulars, to wit:

That article six of agreement be amended so that the said Company shall have power to reduce its capital stock to any sum it may determine on, so that it shall not be less than Five Thousand Dollars. That this corporation have a right to sell any of its bonds or other property, and accept as consideration therefor shares of stock of the Company. That this corporation have the right to issue its bonds at any time, in any denomination the stockholders may wish, so that the entire amount shall not exceed at any one time Twenty-five Thousand Dollars, and the mortgage or other conveyance of any or all of the Company's property as security therefor.

That section eight be amended as follows: That the Board of Directors of this Company shall be not less than three. That a director shall not be disqualified from holding other office or offices in said corporation. That no person shall hold any office to which he may be elected by the stockholders of the Company, unless he shall be the bona fide owner of at least two shares of stock of said Company. And if any person while holding office as aforesaid shall dispose of his stock so that he shall own less than two shares, he shall by such act disqualify himself from holding office, and said office shall be considered surrendered.
