Kinsey School.
An account of the closing exercises of this school appears in today's issue. The editor of this paper was present on Thursday and heard the exercises of that day including the excellent address of Rev. H. W. Battle of this city.

This school is for the education of girls and young ladies. The Principal is a teacher of many years' experience, but is in the full vigor of manhood, a live, progressive, energetic teacher. He has a full corps of competent teachers, including music and art department. Work by the pupils in the art department carried off premiums at the last Fair in this city, and all who visited the Fair know that there were some fine specimens as competitors.

This school is one that not only La Grange but Eastern Carolina should be proud of. The work is thorough, and the health and comfort of the students are closely looked after. The rosy cheeks of the large class in the hall on Thursday gave evidence of the health-investigating exercises, calisthenics, which is daily given. The uniform dress which all pupils are required to wear in public is a special feature of this school and reduces expenses largely in the matter of dress.

There were enrolled during the past year one hundred and fifteen pupils, fifty one of whom were boarders. They represented fifteen counties of this State and one from Florida.

Take it all in all, it will be hard to find a better school for girls and young ladies than the Kinsey School of La Grange.

Mayor's Court.
The vigilant police force had thrown the meshes of the law around a great many supposed offenders between Saturday night and Monday morning, but upon examination they all slipped through but two.

The Tax Levy.
A letter from State Treasurer Bain informs us that the total levy of State and school taxes is 40¢ cents on the one hundred dollar valuation of property and \$1.31 on the poll. The counties can levy 38 1/8 cents on property and 73¢ on the poll. His explanation of the law can be found on page 57 of the revenue pamphlet. The magistrates and commissioners in some of the counties seemed to have overlooked it and levied 37¢ cents for State and school purposes and 79 1/8 for county purposes.

Application to Amend the Charter of the Neuse and Trent River Steamboat Company.
Notice is hereby given that an application will be made by the President and Board of Directors of said Company, before the Clerk of the Superior Court of Craven County, on the 7th day of July, 1889, at 12 o'clock, M., to amend the charter of the said Neuse and Trent River Company, in the following particulars, to wit:

That article six of agreement be amended so that the said Company shall have power to reduce its capital stock to any sum it may determine on, so that it shall not be less than Five Thousand Dollars. That this corporation have a right to sell any of its boats or other property, and accept as considerations therefor shares of stock of the Company.

That this corporation have the right to issue its bonds at any time, in any denomination the stockholders may wish, so that the entire amount shall not exceed at any one time Twenty-five Thousand Dollars, and give mortgages or other conveyance of any or all of the Company's property as security therefor.

That section eight be amended as follows: That the Board of Directors of this Company shall not be less than three. That a director shall not be disqualified from holding other office or offices in said corporation. That no person shall hold any office to which he may be elected by the stockholders of the Company, unless he shall be the bona fide owner of at least two shares of stock of said Company. And if any person while holding office as aforesaid shall dispose of his stock so that he shall own less than two shares, he shall by such act disqualify himself from holding office, and said office shall be considered as surrendered.

CITY ORDINANCE.
Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of City Commissioners of the city of New Bern, N. C.:

SEC. 1. That no person or corporation shall store in one place within the corporate limits of the city of New Bern at one time for a term longer than forty-eight hours, more than five barrels of petroleum, kerosene, naphtha or gasoline.

SEC. 2. That any person or corporation shall store in violation of this ordinance shall pay a fine of twenty-five dollars. That each day said quantity of oil shall remain in one place shall constitute a violation of this ordinance. Provided, that this ordinance shall not be enforced within ten days after the passage of the same.
