THE CARTERET RESOLUTIONS.

Oxley, N. C. June 10th, 1890.

MR. EDITOR:—I see in the JOURNAL of the 6th inst., a communication from Beaufort, containing a set of resolutions passed by the Magistrates and commissioners in joint session. I am surprised at them for taking any such action. It seems to me that it is a matter that they, in an official capacity, had nothing to do with. They say to the Governor "rid us of a man so obnoxious to our people as Washington Bryan President of the A. & N. C. R. R. is." Now I should think, Mr. Editor, that "our" then would mean a majority of the people of Carteret. If it does, then it is a mistake, for a majority of the good people of Carteret know very little about and care less, who is President of the Atlantic & N. C. R. R. is managed. It is only those who live along the line of said Road, who are in any way interested or posted about the way the road is managed, and nine tenths of them will say that Washington Bryan, makes the best President of the Road has ever had. It is a known fact, that he is the most accommodating President, (not in giving free passes) the Road has ever had, and it is a fact too well known to "our people," to even comment upon, that the Road, its culverts, bridges, road bed and track is in better condition than it has ever been since it was first built. "Our people" know that for years, Morehead City, the great summer resort of N. C., and a thriving town, has had no depot, or any accommodation for the traveling public, but under Mr. Bryan's rule and management, it now boasts of a fine, and commodious building for that purpose, and there is a fine one being erected in Newport, and all along the line are new platforms and side tracks to receive freight and accommodate the public. At no time since the Road was built, has there been so much lumber put in, and about the Road. The farmers along the line of said road will tell you, that under Mr. Bryan's management, they have had very little trouble in collecting for stock killed by said Road.

I hope these Resolutions will in no wise mislead our Governor, for while Mr. Chadwick may be the choice of the J. P.'s of this county, he certainly is not the choice of "our people," the people of good old Carteret. For six years Mr. Chadwick has held the party lines in this county, and had such J. P.'s appointed as he saw fit and proper, and of course we could expect nothing better than such a set of resolutions. The Mr. Bell that they say offered those resolutions, I am satisfied never wrote them, (not that he could not,) but I am satisfied, that I can see the case paw that turned the obsequies. I don't believe all the Magistrates were in favor of it; I think they merely passed it by, feeling that they had nothing to do with it, that it was not in their line of duty and so had nothing to say. They say "we appeal to the Governor who was maintained in an hour when he most needed our services, to listen to our solemn appeal, to rid us of a man so obnoxious to our people &c. Now I wish they had explained that, for I can't see how Mr. Bryan has made himself so obnoxious to "our people," to whom he has granted every wish, except perhaps that of a free pass or two. Now Mr. Chadwick is a director of the A. & N. C. R. R., and if the management of the Road has been obnoxious to "our people," he certainly has his share of the stigma to bear. A director has a voice in the management of the Road. They meet once a month and the President simply has to carry out their wishes. Then if Mr. Bryan has made himself so obnoxious to "our people" that he must be turned out, why not Chadwick also? I am sure that Mr. Bryan did as much to elect the gallant Powie Gov. of N. C. as ever did W. S. Chadwick, Esq. I do not know about all the Justices of the Peace sustaining Gov. Powie in

his hour of need, but I do know that his Magistrate in my section said his voice to sustain any one except A. S. Chadwick for the Legislature, on which Mr. W. S. Chadwick (and I was with him several times during the campaign) added the name of W. S. Chadwick for the Congress. These were the only qualifications in the field, so before the people, during last campaign, so far as I learned, from the chairman of our Ex-Com. W. S. Chadwick, and I only heard him mention Chadwick three days before the election. I write this because I know "our people" are dissatisfied with these resolutions, and beg leave to say that they are not their sentiments.
