**Look out for Your License.** The city tax collector has given notice that hereafter persons who are subject to city license tax must apply at the office of the city Clerk within the first five days of each month and obtain the same, or he will at once issue warrants for the recovery of the same. If the tax collector will adhere strictly to this practice he will save himself a vast deal of trouble. It is but little trouble for the dealer to go to the Clerk's office once a month and take out license as the law requires, but it is considerable trouble for the Clerk to hobble around the entire month to collect this tax. The law does not require him to do it, and it ought not to be expected of him.

**A Nest Establishment.** Mr. James Redmond has the neatest establishment for bottling ginger ale, lemon soda, sarsaparilla and beer to be found in the whole country.

He has an inexhaustible well from which there is a constant flow of pure water, supplied by steam pump, which passes through the box where the bottles are washed with the "Lightning Bottlemasher," the water passing out through a pipe into the gutter on the sidewalk and thence into the river. By this arrangement every bottle is washed and rinsed in pure, clean water, a good point when it is known that a clean bottle is essentially necessary in putting up beer, ale, soda, and other light drinks.

Things That Ought to be Published. For the benefit of those who are disposed to get offended because their names appear in the proceedings of the Mayor's court, we wish to say that there is no personal feeling whatever in the matter, although a request may have been made to suppress names. When a newspaper pretends to give the proceedings of a Mayor's court, it ought to do so with fairness and justice to all concerned. Until recently the JOURNAL has not been giving the police reports, but seeing that we have a class of readers who demand all the news of this character we must give it.

The man who knows that it is the custom of a newspaper to give reports of the Mayor's court makes a very unreasonable request when he asks the paper to be partial to him and suppress his name; in fact, if he had the proper respect for the publisher he would not make such a request.

A newspaper has a right to publish the proceedings of a Mayor's court, so it keeps within the bounds of decency. It not only has a right to do so, but the position is taken by many that it is a duty of a newspaper to let its readers know what laws have been violated and who have violated them. The public is much concerned about the execution of the laws. Whenever a law is violated, the whole people are concerned and they ought to be informed of the violation and the manner in which the law was violated. Now if a man don't want his name to appear in the proceedings of the Mayor's court, let him keep out of the Mayor's court. If he gets into the Mayor's court, he is a public man and his name will be published.
