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FARMERS AND MORTGAGES. The farmers constitute a majority of our people, and personally they compare favorably with the rest of mankind.

What brought on this fearful calamity? Heavy, long-continued rain, the bursting of one great and several lesser dams, and the mighty rush of the accumulated mass of water through a narrow valley.

The Forestry Congress of the United States has but recently warned our people of the dangers impending from the destruction of our forests, and has urged that action be taken by State legislatures and by citizens everywhere for their preservation.

This awful event is a warning to the South. Its vast forests are disappearing at a fearful rate. The hardwoods of its mountains, the oaks of its plateaus and the pine forests of its plains are in great demand.

And this business will steadily increase for a long time to come. It cannot, it must not be stopped, and at the same time our forests must be replaced as fast as removed.
