At the trustees meeting yesterday the school question was further discussed. A committee was appointed on the question of continuing the free school and the board adjourned to meet next Monday evening.

There will be a meeting of the Ladies' Memorial Association, this, Tuesday evening, at the residence of Mrs. John Hughes, at 6 o'clock. All members are requested to attend to decide some matters of importance.

The bulk of the truck crop of this vicinity having been marketed, the E. C. D. line have discontinued their Saturday boat, and for the present will make four trips per week—namely, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday.

Gov. Fowle is showing that he belongs to the great men of the nation by following the footsteps of Grover Cleveland and Daniel Webster. He is at Oaracoche and catches from seventy-five to one hundred fish a day, and it is not good fishing weather either.

The shipments of truck from this section this season have been the heaviest ever known. For the last two or three weeks the steamers of the O. D. and E. C. D. lines have gone out loaded every trip, and the A. & N. C. R. has carried immense quantities. At every crossroads, almost, shelters have been erected for the protection of truck, and every truck train finds something to take on every day. The business is assuming huge proportions all along the line of the road, and as soon as the farmers generally learn how to make it pay, it will be a big thing for Eastern Carolina.

New York Truck Market. The following telegram was received yesterday:
NEW YORK, June 17.—Beans continue in heavy supply, selling at 35c to 36c. Stop shipments. Potatoes in very heavy receipts, prime selling at \$3.50 to \$4.50; seconds \$2.00 to \$3.50. Cucumbers \$1.00 to \$2.00.

Peas. Mr. Gardner calls our attention to the price of blackeye peas in the Norfolk market, which is \$3.25 per bag of two bushels, and he suggests that our farmers would find more money in making them than corn or any other grain. He says \$2.50 is a low price for a two bushel bag. At that price we must agree with him that there is money in them, for any old field will make peas.

Justice's Court. Justice Brinson was engaged yesterday in hearing the case of State and Isaac H. Smith against Randolph Station for perjury.

Hollister White appeared for the prosecution, L. J. Moore for the defendant. It appeared that the case originated from one tried at the late term of the Superior court in which Smith was plaintiff and Station defendant. The jury gave a verdict for Station. It is now contended by the prosecution that Station committed perjury in answering that he did not sign a certain document. After hearing the testimony the defendant was bound over to the same term of the Superior court in a bond of one hundred dollars.

Bishop Granbery preached to a very large congregation in the Teachers' Assembly hall Sunday morning. President Crowell of Trinity College came down Saturday night and preached a good sermon in the Methodist church on Sunday night.

Mayor's Court. Two persons charged with failing to comply with city ordinance in regard to backyards before His Honor yesterday. Mr. O. Marks and M. P. Holly were caused to pay the cost of the cases.

Proceedings of the New Berne District Conference of the M. E. Church. MOREHEAD CITY, June 15, 1889. Conference met at 9 o'clock. Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. F. L. Reid.

The minutes of the last session were read and approved. The following arrivals were reported: Col. A. C. Davis, La Grange; William Willis, Straits circuit; J. F. Brinson and Walter Brinson; Pamlico circuit. The report of the committee on 'colportage' and Sunday schools was read. Rev. F. A. Bishop offered a resolution in regard to Sunday school publications and spoke touching the matter, and was followed by Revs. T. J. Gattis and E. A. Willis, who spoke on the same line. The report and the resolution were adopted.

The report of the committee on the spiritual condition of the church was then read. Revs. F. A. Bishop, L. W. Crawford and Mr. Daniel Lane addressed the conference on this matter. Mr. Lane asked the Bishop the question, "Is the learning of passages of scripture by young children beneficial to them?" The Bishop replied that he thought there could be but one opinion in regard to the matter; that the young mind was certainly more susceptible, and a truth learned in childhood would have its influence through coming life; that the earlier the Discipline was taught children the better. The report was adopted.

Rev. F. A. Bishop read a resolution welcoming Revs. F. L. Reid and T. J. Gattis to the conference. Adopted. Rev. Mr. Crawford offered a resolution in regard to the circulation of church literature, which was adopted. Rev. F. L. Reid followed in a brief address on the subject. A second report of the committee on education was read and adopted. Professor Peacock, of Greensboro Female College, was introduced to the conference. He spoke in regard to the work and condition of the college. The Bishop appointed the committee to look after the matter of establishing a high school in this district. The following compose the committee: Revs. R. A. Willis, W. T. Rose, W. J. Crowson, and Messrs. T. A. Green, W. A. Darden, W. L. Arendell, and Dr. J. F. Miller. Rev. Mr. Bishop spoke briefly of the situation and merits of Littleton Female College. Rev. N. M. Jurney had just returned from Trinity College commencement. He addressed the conference on the condition of the college. The college, he said, had a faculty that could hardly be surpassed in equipment. President Crowell was doing a fine work. There has been a meeting in consideration of the proposition to move the college to Raleigh; that he went there opposed to the movement, but after hearing both sides of the question, withdrew his opposition, refusing to be put on record as opposing anything that might be for the very best advantage of the college. The sentiment of the conference seems to favor the removal of the college. Conference adjourned for dinner, and met at 5 p. m. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. W. H. Townsend. Minutes of morning session read and approved. The hour for the election of delegates to the annual conference having arrived, the conference proceeded to ballot. The following were elected: T. A. Green, Dr. F. A. Whitaker, W. H. Applewhite, B. J. Bell, Alternates: W. A. Darden, O. W. Sutton. The committee on quarterly conference records reported. After discussion adopted. Resolutions of thanks were tendered the citizens of Morehead City for liberal hospitality and thoughtfulness; to the Baptist congregation for the use of their church; to Mr. E. G. Harrell for the use of the teacher's assembly building. Rev. Mr. Crawford offered a resolution concerning the church hymn book, desiring to have an edition with the ritual included. Adopted. Resolutions expressing the high regard of the conference for Bishop Granbery and thanks for his presence were adopted. The next business was the selection of a place for the next conference. Rev. Mr. Abernethy invited the conference to Mr. Olive. The invitation was accepted. Minutes were read and approved, thanks tendered the Secretary for his faithfulness, and the conference adjourned this day.
