NORTH CAROLINA NEWS.

From the State Papers.

Shelby New Era: The peach crop this year in Cleveland county is something unprecedented. The oldest inhabitants say they have never seen so many peaches before.

Rutherford Banner: From all reports the crop prospects of Rutherford county are finer than for many years, and unless some disaster overtakes us our people will have enough to spare this year.

Durham Plant: It is with feelings of regret that we announce the death of little James, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Scuthgate, which occurred this morning, after a sickness of several days.

Charlotte News: Hon. Robert P. Waring, Assayer of the United States Mint in this city, has received formal notice to turn over his office to his successor as soon as he qualifies. His successor is Mr. Cramer, of Lexington, and he is expected to invade the mint next Monday.

Twin City Daily: We are reliably informed that there lives six miles south of Salem an old lady by the name of Mrs. Cloa Stewart, who is now in the 103rd year of her age. The date of her birth is recorded in an old family bible, besides there is abundant other testimony to prove it.

Rocky Mount Phoenix: One thousand and one hundred dollars has been given to the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage by Mr. Dennis Simmons, of Williamson, Martin county, S. C.—Ex-Sheriff Black, of Moore county, nearly 12,000 dollars in arrears with the county, and the commissioners have ordered the treasurer to collect the amount or sue him on his bond.

Charlotte Chronicle: Mrs. Richard Neville was killed by lightning in Northampton county last week. She had been out of doors and seeing the storm approaching she went into house. Just as she entered the house and was standing near the fireplace, lightning struck the chimney and killed her. She lived a short time after the shock but was unconscious until she died.

Mr. J. B. West, of this city, has been appointed Deputy Collector or stamp agent at this place to fill the position made vacant by the removal of Dr. G. W. Whitson.

Raleigh Call: The Republicans experienced another surprise this morning at the appointment of Mr. Elihu A. White as Collector of this district. There was another batch of them whose high hopes tumbled down with a crash. Not much talk of the matter has been heard so far, but the remark "every body is getting left" is heard frequently. It seems that most of the "faithful" here confidently expected the appointment of Harris for postmaster and Young for collector; and those who wanted the under seats of the synagogue have been doing all their pretty talking all along this line. This morning while some laborers were at work tearing down the old walls in the rear of the store recently occupied by Heller Bros., an accident occurred which came near proving fatal to some of the workmen. They were undermining a twenty-foot wall when it fell very suddenly, burying the tools and narrowly missing the men.
