The nurse stated that Rev. Smith asked her if she could not find some one to take the child, and that he would pay almost any price to have some one to take it. She first told him no and then thought of this relative in James City and went to see her for the purpose of getting her to take the child which she agreed to do without knowfamily." She, Smith's nurse, also stated that the child was not clothed when it left Smith's house, because it had no clothes, but was wrapped up and placed in a banket.
