LOCAL AUTONOMY THE BOND OF UNITY.

We were writing an article on State Sovereignty and Local Self-government when our attention was directed to an editorial in the New York Star on "Local Autonomy the Bond of Unity," which so well expresses our ideas that we hereby adopt it as our own.

Republicans cannot comprehend the true meaning of E pluribus unum, while Democrats have not the slightest difficulty about understanding it. Therein is the key to the fundamental difference between Democratic and Republican doctrines.

It is local liberty that insures the general union and enables all to heartily co-operate for the common defense and welfare without suffering restrictions unsuited to climate, customs or traditions.

The sovereignty of separate States over their home affairs guarantees the perpetuity of the Republic. We could not have for our standard any procrustean bed, because some of us are too big and some too little to fit it.

The Republican notion is different. It is that the country ought to be a solid whole, with like laws for all parts and with power distributed from a central authority down to the people, instead of being delegated from the people up through the various authorities of localities and States.

The following information is published for the benefit of all concerned. The new pension act does not go into effect before next year, 1890, except so far as relates to determining the character and classification of those who are to receive the benefits.

2. Pensioners whose names are already upon the pension roll will not be required to file new applications, at least until the new pension act goes fully into effect.

3. Blank applications under the old law have been furnished to each county whenever information has been received that the old supply previously furnished has been exhausted.

4. Registers of Deeds will be fully informed as to the time when their duties as prescribed by the new act will be required to be performed by them.

5. The opportunity for the presentation of new applications under the old law terminates with the first Monday in July of the present year.
