### Railroad Assessment.

The board of assessors of the A. & N. C. Railroad, were in session in this city yesterday. There were present, James A. Bryan, chairman of the board of Commissioners of Craven county; B. W. Canady, chairman of the board of Lenoir county; W. L. Arendall, chairman of the board of Carteret county; A. J. Brown, representing the chairman of the board of Wayne county and L. E. Duffy, representing the chairman of the board of Jones county. Jas. A. Bryan was ex-officio chairman of the meeting and John A. Richardson was elected secretary.

The total valuation of the property of the road foots up \$431,100. As the assessment is a matter of interest to these counties we will give the proceedings of the meeting in full tomorrow.

### Death of J. C. Kennedy.

News was received in this city on the fourth of July that Mr. J. C. Kennedy of Lenoir county had died suddenly at his home on the morning of the 3rd. Mr. Kennedy was as well as usual a few minutes before he died. He had for many years taken a prominent part in the politics and public affairs of the county, being a staunch Democrat, never swerving from the great principles upon which the party was built. He was true to a friend, he was a kind and obliging neighbor and an affectionate husband. He was twice married, the first time to Miss Lizzie Wooten, daughter of John C. Wooten, Esq., the second time to Miss Alice Jackson, who survives him.

Mr. Kennedy was about 47 years old. He was buried at the old homestead of his father in Falling Creek township on the 4th of July.

### Why She Came Back.

The steamer Manteo of the O. D. line steamed out of her dock yesterday at 12 m. About half hour afterwards the news spread up the street that the Manteo was coming back and pretty soon a crowd was gathered to ascertain the reason of the return. When she dropped alongside the south end of her wharf and a colored man with a good size satchel in his hand stepped off everybody at once knew what was to pay, or rather knew that some one was trying to get passage without pay. The fellow was a stranger. He took a seat on the Clyde wharf and the stevedores began to crowd around and put questions. They had no particular condemnation for a man who was trying to beat his passage, but they thought he lacked shrewdness and foresight. "You ought to have crawled into the smoke stack," suggested one; another said "his police (satchel) is too large; you order known you couldn't beat it all that baggage." Derry Eborn, the man who carried the basket to James City on Wednesday night of last week thought it an outrage that they should be laughing at this man as every one of them would doubtless be trying to beat your way on the same boat. At this point another sympathetic friend with a beaver arrived and after almost bringing the tears from the strangers suggested that the proper thing to do was to raise the money to pay his passage. "Ten cents apiece from this crowd," said he, will pay it. And remember we may be cooh in his town sometime and be in the same fix." This suggestion fell like a bomb shell and the crowd scattered pretty rapidly, the beaver hat man being among the first to move.

This gave the reporter an opportunity of getting near enough to inquire of the stranger who he was and where he was from. He said he came from Morehead City and his satchel was marked "T. D. Davis." When asked his name he made no answer, but produced a letter of recommendation, written with a type writer, from Duff Merrick, Esq., of Asheville. The letter recommended Tobias Davis to be an honest man, etc. He said he had been at work with Mr. Ransy at the Atlantic Hotel and intended going back there last night. He worked in loading the Manteo and thought he would work his way to Norfolk, but found that he could not do it without the captain's consent.

### Confederate Veterans.

Pursuant to a call published in the JOURNAL, a considerable number of Confederate veterans of Craven county assembled in the court house in New Berne at 12 o'clock on the Fourth of July for the purpose of organizing a Craven county Confederate Veterans Association.

General Robert Ransom was called to the chair and General Cullen A. Battle appointed Secretary.

General Ransom, on taking the chair, addressed the meeting in a few well chosen and highly patriotic words, and then declared the meeting organized and ready for business. Those present in sympathy with the objects of the meeting and wishing to take part therein were requested to come forward and register their names. Responses were made as follows:

Mr. J. J. Wolfenden moved the appointment of a committee to prepare and present to the meeting a plan of procedure, the motion was adopted, and the chairman announced the following committee: J. J. Wolfenden, James A. Bryan, Enoch Wadsworth and S. W. Latham. The committee at once retired from the room to prepare their report. During their absence, at the call of the meeting, patriotic remarks were made by General Ransom, General Battle and Major Hughes. The committee returned to the court room and through their chairman Capt. Wolfenden submitted the following report:

Your committee upon organization beg to submit the following as the plan of organization of the Confederate Veterans of Craven county: to wit:

There shall be a president, five vice presidents, a secretary and treasurer and an executive committee of five, all to be elected by ballot.

The secretary shall enroll the name, company and regiments of each ex-Confederate soldier, and the name of the vessel of each Confederate sailor who presents his name for membership.

The county association shall recommend two ladies in each township who shall be especially commissioned by the president of the State association to aid in the glorious work of establishing a home for the old and broken down veterans of North Carolina or taking such other action as may be deemed advisable to render to such veterans the most substantial aid and comfort.

All citizens of Craven county who served in the Confederate army or navy and were honorably discharged shall be eligible as members of this organization.

There shall be elected at each annual meeting of this association two delegates, with power to select their alternates, to represent this association at all meetings of the State association.

The annual meeting of this association shall be held at New Berne on 12 o'clock M. on Confederate Memorial Day.

The president shall have power to call special meetings at such times and places as he may think necessary.

All Confederate soldiers and sailors moving into this county from another county or State, shall, upon presenting to the executive committee a certificate of membership of the Confederate veterans association of said other county

or State, be admitted to the privileges of membership of this association.

It shall be the duty of the executive committee to examine the claims of all persons applying membership of this association and to determine as to whether they are or are not eligible.

The above plan may be altered or amended by a majority of the members present at any call or regular meetings.

The report was unanimously adopted.

The chairman then announced that the election of President was in order. Mr. James W. Biddle and Capt. Matt Manly were placed in nomination, and J. J. Wolfenden and Captain K. R. Jones were appointed tellers. The ballots were counted and Capt. Manly was declared elected President of the Craven County Confederate Veteran's Association.

On motion of Mr. Biddle the election was declared unanimous.

General Ransom retired from the chair, and Capt. Manly assumed it and addressed the association, tendering thanks for the honor conferred and paying a deserved tribute to Confederate veterans.

The election of Vice-Presidents being next in order a ballot was taken which resulted in the election of J. W. Biddle, W. C. Brewer, Alex. Miller and W. R. Barrington.

The chairman then announced the election of a Secretary and Treasurer in order. A ballot was taken, which resulted in the election of W. G. Brinson, Esq.

The Association next proceeded to elect an Executive Committee, and Charles Duffy, K. R. Jones, W. B. Lane, S. R. Street and C. A. Battle, were elected said committee.

Messrs. James A. Bryan and William B. Lane were chosen as delegates to represent the Craven County Association in the State Veteran Association at any meeting to be held during the current year.

It was then resolved that a committee of one from each township be appointed to recommend two ladies from each township to the Executive Committee, who, when endorsed by a meeting of the Association, would be nominated to the President of the State Association "to be commissioned by the President of the State Association to aid in the glorious work of establishing a Home for the old and broken down veterans of North Carolina, or for any other measure as may be adopted by the State Association."

The President stated that he was not prepared to appoint this committee, but that the committee would be announced at an early day.

On motion of Mr. James A. Bryan the plan of organization was so amended as to constitute ten members present at any meeting a quorum for the transaction of business.

The wish having been expressed that an expression of the sense of the Association be had as to the best way of benefiting the old soldiers, Gen. Ransom, Captain Jones, Mr. James A. Bryan, Mr. Barrington and others spoke to the subject; after which it was

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Association that the best thing for the old soldiers is to make them comfortable in their own homes, by an increase of pensions; but if this is impracticable this Association will co-operate in any measure of relief that the State Association may adopt.

The Association then adjourned.

### The Macadamized Road.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—I was greatly surprised to see in the proceedings of the city council, published this morning, a report from the committee on wharves and streets, stating in substance that in constructing the new road to the National Cemetery, all the requirements of the specifications thereof have been complied with—"that the road is laid with three courses of stone, the first course varying in size from four to eight inches, the second layer of smaller stones, the whole of which is covered with pulverized shell-rock."

What those gentlemen saw at the upper end of the road visited at the request of the parties in charge I do not know; nor do I know by what means they ascertained the number of layers and sizes of the spalls covered up in the road over which they passed; but I do know that so far as it applies to the road between Broad and Queen streets, by which I passed every day while in course of construction, the report is false, and if the committee know pulverized shell-rock from Jones county they will be convinced of the fact if they do not change their report.
