Railroad under the influence of the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad and destroying all hope of friendly relations with the Richmond and Danville, has just about destroyed our corn trade, and we all know that this same Raleigh influence is making a desperate effort to continue their control. It only remains to be seen whether the noble and patriotic liberty-loving, law-abiding Daniel G. Fowle will allow the same influence which has become interested by the purchase of a few shares of stock, not for the good of we people whose destinies to a great extent depend upon the road, but to prevent our advancement, to direct the policy of this road for another four years.

Let us unite and inaugurate such industries and enterprises as will employ our people and leave the profits of their labor in our own town. This is what the co-operative factory means and this is why you should go to the meeting tomorrow night determined to do all you can for its success.

New BERNE, N. C., July 5, 1889. The board of appraisers and assessors to value the property of the Atlantic and N. C. R. R. Co. for the year 1889 in conformity with section 46 of the Act entitled an act to provide for the assessment of property and the collection of taxes, ratified March 11, 1889, and after due notice met at the court house in New Berne, Craven county, N. C., on Friday July 5, 1889, at 11 o'clock a.m., for the purpose of assessing the taxable property of said Railroad Company according to said act. Present: Craven, Jas. A. Bryan, Esq., chairman board of commissioners of Craven county, ex-officio chairman.

Wayne, A. J. Brown, representing E. B. Borden, chairman of the board of commissioners of Wayne county. Carteret, W. L. Arendell, chairman of the board of commissioners of Carteret county. Lenoir, B. W. Canady, chairman of the board of commissioners of Lenoir county. Jones, L. E. Duffy, represents chairman board of commissioners of Jones county.
