adjust or unequal taxation now imposed upon it.

10th. We endorse the wise, patriotic and judicious administration of Governor Fitzhugh Lee.

11th. We believe that men who were disabled in the service of the State during the late conflicts between the States and the widows of those who lost their lives in such service are deserving of aid and protection, and we favor such liberal appropriations within the revenue of the State as will tend to this end.

12th. While earnestly in favor of reforming the tariff upon just, conservative and economic principles, we recognize that the issues and conditions which confront us in Virginia in the impending contest are immeasurably more important than tariff reform or a reduction of Federal taxation, important as those questions are. Every business interest of the State, every social interest, every political interest, demands that the Democratic party, the party of the people, the party of peace, good order and good government, which has safely and wisely conducted the government of the State through trying and troublesome times in the past, shall be continued in power. We oppose the Republican party as a party of boss rule; as a party of sectional strife; as a party of high taxes, of corrupt and extravagant expenditure of public revenues, of unjust and oppressive treatment of the people of the Southern States; the creator of trusts, the promoter of monopolies. We oppose the Republican party as a stirrer up of strife between the races; as a false friend of the colored race and an enemy of the white race, and we confidently submit the claims, principles and candidates which we present to the judgment of an enlightened and patriotic people.

On motion of W. S. Rone, the five front seats were set apart for the conference bar.

After a few remarks by the President, W. W. Rose addressed the meeting on "The Object of Sunday School Work." The presentation of this subject was earnest, clear and practical. In the first place Sunday schools must have some object in view, that object the same as the church has—the salvation of souls. Not especially to make Methodists of them in the way of Christ. Their instructors should be Christians, those who have been converted and given themselves up to God, and the best time to give this instruction was in their youth.

Rev. L. W. Crawford next spoke, giving a careful and closely-studied review of the "Condition of the S. S. Work in this District." He commenced by saying that the subject was seemingly an easy one, but that he had found it to be quite difficult to be accurate in getting reliable information, owing to the magnitude of the district. In it there were seventy-three organized churches with a membership of six thousand souls and five hundred teachers. Particular stress was laid upon the importance of the selection of teachers for these schools and having them open all the year round, also to the great indifference on the part of parents as to their children attending Sunday school. Having good and live superintendents was another matter of no little importance. Throughout the

district every town and village had its Sunday Schools, but he regretted to say, there was not that advancement he would like to see; in fact, a comparison with the statistics a year or two ago was somewhat unfavorable. To conduct Sunday schools properly there should be sufficient funds to defray necessary expenses, and to run them successfully, without it was a false idea. Places of worship should be made comfortable and attractive both winter and summer. There should be maps, charts, blackboards &c.

It was a splendid address and given the best of attention. On motion convention adjourned till three o'clock in the afternoon.

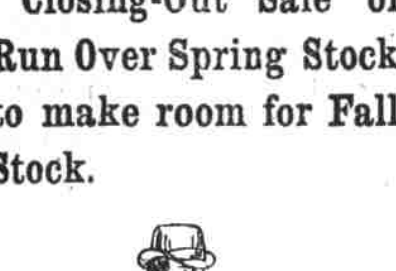
