New Berge, the Central Commercial City of the North Carolina Coast .-Letters by an Old Timer.

NUMBER 3.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—This paragrah from the late report of President Bryan, of the A. & N. C. R. R., is significant, and worthy of the most earnest and serious consideration:

"There is a probability that during next year foreign cotton ships will come to our terminus at Morehead for cargoes. If this can be accomplished we should be able to reach territory for this class of freight which we have not yet been able to penetrate, and our earnings should be thereby increased."

The only thing necessary to secure this is the erection of a cotton compress. The best location, for the present, at least, is New Berne. That city should have had a compress long ago for the cotton that's conducted through the sounds to Norfolk. It would have paid the New Berne cotton market and trades-people and the steamers, for it would have about doubled the receipts. Cotton for export will seek compress points, and avoid such as do not possess these necessary facilities.

Any foreign ship can come to Morehead City that can get into Wilmington. The draught of water on the Beaufort bar is greater than at the mouth of the Cape Fear, and the entrance easier and better. The ships will prefer to come, to Morehead, if the cargoes are assured. With proper facilities for compressing, the cotton will come in abundance.

About all the cotton sold in the New Berne market, or shipped for sale in Norfolk, is bought for foreign export Why should it be necessary to send this cotton to Norrolk to start abroad when we have; such an outlet as that through Beaufort harbor? Why not make use of our own home port, and give our line of railroad a sustaing patronage?

With exporting facilities New Berne can easily reach out and double her cotton receipts, and correspondingly increase her general trade. The place is not dead, as has been so often proclaimed. The people may be asleep, but no place with such superior facilities and unexampled advantages can ever die.

If New Berne would go to work and concentrate her trade energies upon the port at Morehead City, an appropriation could be secured for the improvement of the bar to a depth of twenty-eight or thirty feet of water. This can be easily accomplised, and no mistake about

Now that the management of the Atlantic & (North Carolina railroa 1 has passed into the hands of a Beaufort harbor man, we may reasonably hope that every effort will be made to develop the traffic resources of the lower end of the line, and to swell the volume of commerce through its port terminal. Mr. Chadwick will most assuredly take upon it.

New Berne, by taking hold of the project of making Beaufort harbor her deep water outlet, the only such she can ever hope for, can immediately promote the scheme of Mr. Bryan, and further the efforts of Mr. Chadwick to success. It is to her vital interest to do it.
