CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

October 8, 1889.
The Mayor and fire department committees met at the city hall at 7 o'clock, for the purpose of receiving the New Berne steam fire engine boiler as per order of board of city council at last meeting.

MAYOR'S REPORT.
Questions that I submitted to engineers to be answered as to boiler.

1. What is the diameter of the boiler? 30 inches.
2. What is the length of shell? 60 in. Should be 80 in.
3. What is the diameter of the furnace? 28 in. Should be 28 1/2 in.
4. What is length of furnace? 36 in. Should be 39 in.
5. How many smoke tubes? 124. Should be 158.
6. What is diameter of smoke tube? 1 1/2 and 1 1/4 in. Should be 1 1/2 and 1 1/4 in.
7. What is length of smoke tube? 24 in. Should be 30 in.
8. How many tube sheets? 2. Should be 3.
9. How many drop tubes? 112. Should be 120.
10. What is length of drop tubes? 22, 26, 28 in. Should be 26 in.
11. Has everything been done in a workmanlike manner? Yes.

On investigation I find boiler not up to specifications, and by leaving out drop tubes the power of boiler is diminished. Cannot say whether the other alterations are beneficial or not. Think the matter should be left to the board of council for investigation.

Councilman Crawford moved to refer the matter to the special meeting of the board, to be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

OCTOBER 9, 1889.
A special meeting of the board of city council was held this morning at 10 o'clock, Mayor Williams presiding. Present, Councilmen Burrus, Lane, Crawford, Ellis, Bishop and Willis.

The Mayor stated to the board that they had been called for the purpose of acting upon Mr. C. R. F. Edwards' bill, and accepting the boiler, as per motion of Councilman Crawford at committee's meeting last night. The engineers submitted the following answers to the questions submitted to them by the committee, he reported to the board as regards the building of the New Berne steam fire engine.

Mr. C. R. F. Edwards' contract and bill for extra work on boiler to the amount of \$157.43 was read by the Mayor.

Councilman Burrus moved to accept boiler and pay Mr. Edwards \$100. Councilman Crawford moved to amend by paying the whole bill and accepting the boiler. A vote being taken resulted as follows: Ayes, Councilmen Crawford and Ellis; nays, Councilmen Burrus, Lane, Willis and Bishop. The amendment was lost. A vote being taken upon the original motion resulted as follows: Ayes, Burrus, Lane and Willis; nays, Crawford, Ellis and Bishop, which resulted in a tie. The Mayor stated that he had no right to vote upon an appropriation, according to the charter. Councilman Burrus moved that the matter be left to referees, two to be selected by the board and two by Mr. Edwards; the agreement between Mr. Edwards and the board that the decision of the referees should be final. Carried. Councilman Burrus moved that Messrs. Basil Manly and Capt. Gray be requested to serve as referees for the city, and that the clerk be instructed to notify them of the same and furnish them with contract, bill and report of engineers. Adopted unanimously. Board adjourned.

NORTH CAROLINA NEWS.

From the State Papers.
Concord Times: The juke bagging trust is throated at last. A Cabarrus man came to town Wednesday with his bale of cotton wrapped in a bed quilt.

Charlotte News: The congregation of the Associate Reformed church of Charlotte today bought one of the most beautiful building sites in the city, and the next spring they will begin the erection of one of the prettiest churches in the South.

Goldboro Argus: At his home in Grantham's township, this county, W. H. Hood, a well known and highly esteemed citizen, and one who was universally loved and respected, departed this life in the triumph of a faith made zealous by a life of exemplary devotion and Christian purity.

Wadesboro Messenger-Intelligencer: Mr. Frank Batliff has a cow and mule that have stalls near together. Not long ago the cow was licking the feed from the mule's trough through a crack, and the mule, not relishing this proceeding, proceeded to bite about two inches of her tongue off.

Wilmington Star: The Pittsboro Record announces the demise recently, in Chatham county, of a goose at the respectable age of somewhere between forty and fifty years. Its age is vouchered for by a citizen of veracity, who in fifty-two years of age, on whose place the goose has resided "ever since he can remember."

Wilmington Star: Five horses for the use of the fire department arrived yesterday, and were driven up to the city hall in the afternoon for inspection by the committee of the fire department of the board of aldermen. The largest horses—a dark brown pair, weighing 3,190 pounds—were attached to Hook and Ladder truck No. 1, a pair of grays, weighing 2,890 pounds to the Atlantic engine, and a bay, weighing 1,350 pounds, to the Atlantic hose car.

Winston Daily: The old fire engine, which we publish a cut of on this page, was brought over from Germany to Salem in the year of 1785, and was the first fire engine ever brought to America.

Below we give the amount of freight in pounds shipped from this point during the past twelve months ending August 31, under their different heads: Plug tobacco, 10,474,004; leaf tobacco, 3,394,187; cotton factory products, 757,249; dried fruit, 1,075,639; merchandises, 3,202,844.

Wilmington Messenger: Gov. Fowle and Col. L. L. Polk have been requested to extend to United States Secretary of Agriculture Rusk, a special invitation to attend the State Fair and deliver an address. Gov. Rusk will be requested to select the day for his attendance, and the Messenger hopes he may be able to accept the invitation. FROM LAST NIGHT'S PAPERS.

DEMOCRATS VICTORIOUS IN MONTANA—THE KNIGHTS TEMPLAR IN WASHINGTON.

HELENA, Oct. 8.—The election of Joseph Toole, Dem., for Governor, is now conceded by a majority of 800 to 600; Carter, Rep., for Congress, has 1,000 majority. The Democrats claim the Legislature by seven. The Republicans will not concede as much, but say that on the face of the returns it is Democratic, and claim fraud in Silver Bow and Deer Lodge counties. The general opinion is that there will be no contest, and that the Democrats will have the Governor and the Legislature.

An election was held Tuesday in Chattanooga Tenn., under the Australian system of voting, and resulted in the election of the Republican candidate for Mayor.

The Knights Templar parade in Washington city Tuesday was of a most magnificent character, and Commanderies from all parts of the country participated. The city was gorgeously decorated, and together with the rich insignia of the Knights, all mounted on horseback, the scene was brilliant indeed. Fifteen thousand Knights were in line, who were reviewed by the President from a stand in front of the White House. The number of visitors in the city is estimated at fifty thousand.

The Raleigh correspondent of the Wilmington Messenger says that Boyle's counsel believe Boyle will get a new trial. The counsel for Boyle also believe that a majority of the people desire to see him get a new trial.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Oct. 8.—The Synod of North Carolina convened tonight at 7:30 o'clock in the First Presbyterian church. Rev. J. Henry Smith, D. D., of Greensboro, preached the opening sermon. The Rev. J. M. Warey, of the Concord Presbytery, was elected Moderator, and Rev. Alex. Sprunt and P. R. Law temporary clerks.
