This is an important proceeding. We will have more to say concerning the matter tomorrow.

The Truck Farms.
A few minutes ride out on Trent and Neuse roads yesterday evening revealed the fact that our truckers are making good use of the beautiful weather. Mr. Rhem is putting his farm in the very neatest condition and his cabbages are growing off nicely.

Driving through Mr. Crockett's farm we find a splendid crop of corn ready to house; a very fine rutabaga crop, turnips etc., and Mr. Crockett was having a crop of two hundred barrels of beautiful fall Irish potatoes housed for seed next spring. He banks them as he does sweet potatoes and says he has no trouble in keeping them, and they are more reliable for seed than the Northern seed.

Mr. Crockett also pointed out several large banks of sweet potatoes and said he had one hundred and fifty bushels in the cellar. There were also numerous hay stacks, fodder stacks and all sorts of feed for stock and numerous compost, scattered about for the next crop, to be seen. It really looked to us like this is a prosperous farm where there is plenty for making and beasts and that the occupants and owners ought to be satisfied.

We did not get over on the cemetery road; when we do we expect to find things bright and prosperous.

AN ELECTION TO BE HELD.

Proceedings of the County Commissioners—The East Carolina Land and Railway Company Applies for a Subscription by the City.—A Petition Presented.

The board of county commissioners of Craven county met at the court house in New Berne, November 4, 1889. Present: J. A. Bryan, chairman; E. W. Smallwood, J. A. Meadows, Wm. Cleve and Daniel Lane.

It was ordered that the tax on the lot on Middle street assessed against M. Hahn be remitted, the said lot having been listed by I. H. Smith.

The board took a recess until 3 o'clock p. m.

It was ordered that the double tax charged against Mrs. Susan Abbott, of No. — township, be remitted on payment of a single tax for the year.

Ordered that Wm. Foy be allowed \$30 additional pay for listing taxes for 1889.

Ordered that Mrs. Watson be allowed \$3 per month, to be paid to L. F. Taylor.

Board took a recess until 11 o'clock a. m. Tuesday. Present: J. A. Bryan, Wm. Cleve, E. W. Smallwood, J. A. Meadows and Daniel Lane.

The clerk of the Superior Court was authorized to purchase an indenture book for binding out children, not to cost more than \$3.50.

Mr. C. E. Foy, President of the East Carolina Land and Railway Company, and Mr. Knox, a representative of the board and through Messrs. Clark & Clark, attorneys, presented a petition signed by a number of the leading business men of the city and an application from the company. The petition and application are here given and are explanatory of themselves:

A PETITION.
To the Board of Commissioners of Craven County:

We, the undersigned, freeholders and resident tax-payers of the City of New Berne, respectfully petition your honorable body to submit to the qualified voters of said city a proposition to subscribe fifty thousand dollars to the capital stock of the East Carolina Land and Railway Company for the purpose of aiding said Company in the construction of a railroad from the city of New Berne to some point on New River in Onslow county, to connect with the railroad now in process of construction from Wilmington, N. C., to said New River; and to issue bonds of the said city of New Berne, in payment thereof. The subscription of said stock, and the issuance of said bonds in payment thereof, to be dependent upon the completion of said road, as may be regulated and provided for by your body.

To the Board of Commissioners of Craven County, North Carolina:

Gentlemen:—The East Carolina Land and Railway Company hereby applies through you for a subscription, by the city of New Berne, to the capital stock of the said company in the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), to aid it to build in conjunction with the Wilmington, Onslow and East Carolina Railroad Company, a line of railway from the city of New Berne, through the counties of Craven, Jones, Onslow, Pender and New Hanover, to Wilmington, North Carolina.

This application is made on the following terms and conditions, to wit:—First—This company will deposit with the city treasurer such sum as your honorable body shall direct to meet the necessary expenses attending the submission of the question of such subscription to the vote of the qualified electors of said city, any surplus remaining to be returned to said company.

Second—In case such subscription shall be made the same shall be payable in and by the coupon bonds of said city, running thirty years, bearing interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable annually at some bank in the city of New York or the city of New Berne, as you shall determine.

Third—Said bonds shall be prepared as soon as practicable after the said subscription shall have been made, but at the expense of said railway company, and shall be placed in the hands of a trustee or trustees to be appointed by your Board and the Mayor and Board of Commissioners of the city of New Berne, with the consent and approval of said company, who shall hold the same until

the said East Carolina Land and Railway Company shall have built its said railway from the city of New Berne to the New River in Onslow county, so as to form a junction with the railway of the Wilmington, Onslow and East Carolina Railroad Company, ready for the running of trains thereupon, such railway to be built of the standard gauge, and laid with steel rails of a weight and quality equal to those now being used by the said Wilmington, Onslow and East Carolina Railroad. On the completion of said railway as aforesaid the said trustee or trustees upon demand of the said East Carolina Land and Railway Company, through its President, shall deliver the entire issue of said bonds to the treasurer of said company, first cutting therefrom and destroying any coupons thereto attached which may have theretofore matured.

Fourth—If this subscription is made, no part of the construction of said railway between the city of New Berne and the Jones county line on the route aforesaid shall be done with or by convict labor and so far as practicable in the construction of its road between the city of New Berne and the Jones county line, other things being equal, preference will be given to the citizens of your county in the work of such construction.

The East Carolina Land & Railway Company, by C. E. Foy, Its President.

Upon a petition being presented therefor to this board of more than twenty-five persons, freeholders, qualified voters and resident taxpayers of the city of New Berne, as prescribed by act of Assembly entitled an act to amend an act entitled an act to incorporate "The East Carolina Land and Railway Company," being chapter 198 of the laws of 1887, and ratified the 12th day of February, A. D., 1889. It is therefore

Ordered, That an election be held in the city of New Berne on Thursday, the 9th day of January, A. D., 1890, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said city the question of subscribing, on the part of said city, the sum of \$50,000 to the capital stock of the said "The East Carolina Land and Railway," in coupon bonds running 30 years, to be issued by said city of the denomination of \$500 each and drawing interest at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum, payable annually, and the levy of four thousand dollars annually to pay said interest and provide a sinking fund for the extinguishment of said principal. And it is further ordered that thirty days notice shall be given of said election by advertisement at the court house door and at each of the election precincts in said city, and also by publication thereof in the New Berne Daily JOURNAL, a newspaper published in said city, all as provided in the act of Assembly, entitled an act to incorporate "The East Carolina Land and Railway Company," and the aforesaid act amendatory thereof.

It is ordered by the board of commissioners of Craven county that the East Carolina Land and Railway Company shall be required to deposit with the treasurer of the county the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars for the purpose of defraying the expenses of an election to be held on Thursday, January 9th, 1890, to determine the question of the subscription by the city of New Berne of \$50,000 to the capital stock of said company, the balance of said sum, if any, to be returned to said company, and the deficit if any be paid the treasurer of said county by said company. It is further ordered that said sum of one hundred and fifty dollars shall be paid to said treasurer on or before the first Monday in December, 1889.

It is ordered by the board of commissioners of Craven county that there shall be an entirely new registration of voters in each voting precinct in the city of New Berne for the purpose of holding an election in said city on Thursday, January 9th, A. D., 1890, at which election the question of subscribing \$50,000 to the capital stock of the East Carolina Land and Railway Company in coupon bonds of said city running 30 years and drawing interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum, and the levy of a tax to pay the interest and provide a sinking fund to discharge the principal is to be submitted to the qualified voters of said city; and, it is further ordered that notice of said new registration shall be given for thirty days prior to said election in each voting precinct in said city.
