Union Service under the Auspices of the Y. M. C. A., at the Baptist Church.

SECOND DAY.

MORNING SERVICE.—The union service at 10:30 a. m. was exceedingly interesting. As had been requested a large number of requests for prayer were laid upon the table, and read in the hearing of all. Quite a number, male and female, rose and requested prayer for friends and relatives, and in response several volunteer prayers were offered. Mr. Fife made an effective talk on prayer, which was beautifully illustrated with affecting narratives. He emphasized the necessity of having faith that prayer will be answered. If a child goes to his father and asks for a new hat and his father says, "I will bring you one when I come to dinner," the boy knows he will get that hat. So we must feel sure that God will keep his promises.

NIGHT SERVICE.—The Baptist church was filled almost to overflowing last night at 7:30 o'clock. Every pew on the lower floor and in the gallery was filled, and chairs were placed in the aisles for the accommodation of others. Mr. Fife's subject was "Gathering in the lost ones." He did not preach a prepared sermon, but his talk was impressive. He bases his statements on scripture. He uses plain, common-place language, and says some very plain things. He desires to see more backbone, more boldness, more courage manifested in the lives of Christians. He is very unreserved and fearless in his denunciation of the evils of the ball room. He calls hypocritical church members by their right names, and declares that they are the greatest obstruction to the progress of Christianity. He is very earnest in his appeals to professed Christians to do their duty. He says he does not endeavor and will not endeavor to drive or compel sinners to embrace the Christian religion, but will plead with them, will pray for them, will point them to the "Lamb of God that taketh away the sins of the world," will speak to them plainly, boldly, fearlessly, gently, patiently.

The congregation seemed to be impressed with the intense Christian zeal, the bold, unmistakable language, the deep, rich voice of "Bill Fife, the New Berne boy, the Drummer Evangelist." After the congregation was dismissed an inquiry meeting was held and a large number of the congregation remained in.

State vs Samuel Lockey, colored; farming with unlawful fence; pleaded not guilty; verdict, guilty.
