OFFICERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

On Saturday the Republican members of the House of Representatives met in caucus and made the following nominations:
For Speaker—Thomas B. Reed, of Maine.
For Clerk—Edward McPherson, of Pennsylvania.
For Sergeant at Arms—A. J. Holmes, of Iowa.
For Doorkeeper—Charles W. Adams, of Maryland.
For Postmaster—J. A. Wheat, of Wisconsin.
For Chaplain—Rev. Charles Ramsdell, of the District of Columbia.

In the contest for Speaker the Republican members from North Carolina divided, Mr. Cheatham voting for Mr. Reed, and Mr. East for Mr. McKimley. Mr. Reed has long been before the county and is admitted by men of all parties to be a man of ability. The Washington Post says: "From a strictly partisan standpoint, Mr. Reed's nomination was the best that could have been made. From the standpoint of expediency, or even of sound policy, it may be viewed differently. However, it depends largely upon Mr. Reed whether his selection prove wise or unwise. At the present writing our Democratic friends are more than satisfied with the result; the Republicans accept it with grace if not with one mind."

Mr. Reed brings to the Speakership a knowledge bred of long familiarity with public men and public affairs, a parliamentary experience that will render its merely routine duties easy of performance, an integrity of personal character that never has been assailed, a courage that is seldom surprised and never daunted, and a devotion to party principles and party methods that knows no shadow of turning."

Mr. McPherson, the clerk, is returned to his old position. Long practice has made him familiar with the duties of his office. Some of his past acts have been severely criticised, He is an ardent Republican and always uses his office to advance the interest of his party.

A. J. Holmes, the Sergeant at Arms. He is an ex-Congressman of Iowa.

Charles W. Adams, the Doorkeeper, won in the hardest fights of the day defeating Captain Wheat.

Captain Wheat, the Postmaster owes his election to the popularity evinced in his race for doorkeeper.

Rev. Charles B. Ramsdell, nominated for Chaplain, is the only nominee of the caucus whose election was doubtful. The election by the House has taken place and it will be no surprise to us to learn that Dr. Milburn, the blind man eloquent who was the Chaplain of the fiftieth Congress, has been re-elected. It is creditable to Republicans that "before the vote was taken in caucus Mr. Payson made a three-minute speech in behalf of Rev. Mr. Milburn in which he said that it was absurd to mix politics with religion, and that he would not feel bound by any caucus action in this matter. He was supported by half a dozen Republican members."

Taking it all and all, we have no

complaint to make of the organization of the House. The nomination of Dr. Milburn would have been in the highest degree gratifying to us but it was not expected and we were not disappointed.

Jones County Items.

The county commissioners are in session. Also the board of education.

We have just learned that there will be another exodus tomorrow (Tuesday).

Miss Mary Pollock, who has been afflicted with cancer for several years, died Sunday, aged 62 years.

Seed cotton has been brought to Trenton during the past week in large quantities. We suppose, though, that it is almost all in.

New river trout were plentiful at Trenton on Saturday last, selling at 8 to 10 cents apiece. Eggs are scarce and sell readily at 15 cents per dozen at Trenton.

We see a notice posted on the streets of Trenton that there will be a series of religious lectures delivered at Trenton by a reformed drunkard, beginning on the 8th of December next, free to all and all are invited.

We learn that several of the colored men from Cypress creek and Tackahoe townships are exodus to the Wilmington and Oaslow Railroad to make money. We are inclined to believe that their heads are level.

There will be a very important meeting of Trenton Alliance on Saturday next. We trust that every member of this Sab Alliance will be present, as there will be business of importance suggested which we desire to have every member to pass upon.

We learn from Mr. B. Jones, the agent at Trenton, that he has engaged 25 hands at Trenton and sent them to work on the Kingston and Greenville Railroad today (Monday) and yet others were applying. We think that Kansas and railroads will take all the colored laborers from the farmers of Jones county.

We learn that letters have been received here containing urgent requests from hunters of the adjoining counties for our citizens to secure from the Jones county exodusters a lot of fine coon dogs. Let me inform you, gentlemen, fine coon dogs in Jones county are remarkably scarce; but if you were to request "lick skillets" we can furnish you a car load of real genuine fellows, of all colors, spots, sizes, and conditions, some of which can polish the inside of a greasy skillet to shining perfection; others that can steal the eggs from an old setting hen without her knowing it; and, lastly, we have an indefinite number that are so thin and poor that when thoroughly aroused all they can do is to lean against a sapling and growl. Please say, gentlemen, which kind is wanted, in your next letter.

Proceedings of County Commissioners.

The Board met in regular monthly session on Monday, December 2. Present: E. W. Smallwood, Daniel Lane, E. H. Meadows.

On motion, James A. Bryan was elected chairman of the Board for the ensuing year. The chairman being absent, E. W. Smallwood was elected temporary chairman.

Ordered that the valuation of lot of Miss Annie Morris, on Pollock street be reduced from \$800 to \$500, error having been made in listing.

Jas. Brinkley was placed on the pauper book with an allowance of \$2 per month.

At this hour J. A. Bryan, chairman, appeared and took his seat.

On account of an error, the valuation of Mrs. Margaret Tighman's lot on Broad street was reduced from \$800 to \$500.

The valuation of lot on Jerkins' land listed by Phillis Davenport, township No. 8, was reduced from \$250 to \$50.

E. W. Carpenter, clerk of the Superior court, presented his bond for renewal, in the sum of \$10,000. Accepted.

Judge P. Stanly, constable No. 8 township, presented his bond in the sum of \$1,000. Accepted.

Henry Lovick presented his bond as surveyor, in the sum of \$1,000. Accepted.

Commissioners Smallwood and Lane were appointed a committee to examine and audit the sinking fund account.

J. A. Richardson, register of deeds, presented reports for taxes collected on marriage licenses. Found correct and ordered to be recorded and filed.

The Board took a recess and met again at 3:30 p. m. Present: chairman Bryan, Commissioners Daniel Lane and E. W. Smallwood.

It was ordered that Wm. Lane, sheriff, and J. A. Richardson, register of deeds, have until the first Monday in January next to renew their official bonds.

E. W. Carpenter, clerk Superior court, presented reports of public school funds received by him.

Found correct and ordered to be recorded and filed.

Eugene Tucker tendered his bond as standard keeper, in the sum of \$300. Accepted.

Poll tax assessed against Z. B. Loftin, No. 1 township, was remitted, he being under 21 years of age.

The Board adjourned to 11 o'clock Tuesday.

Board met on Tuesday 11 o'clock a. m. Present: Chairman Bryan, and E. W. Smallwood, J. A. Meadows, D. Lane.

The committee appointed to audit the sinking fund account reported that they had examined the same and found it correct and had cancelled four vouchers.

The property of Daniel Daugherty listed in No. 8 township was ordered to be stricken from said list, it being listed in No. 9 township, and the valuation of said property was reduced from \$560 to \$125.

W. H. Jackson tendered his resignation as wood inspector and was accepted.

Thos. Daniels, treasurer, presented his bond, in the sum of \$33,000. Accepted.

O. S. Becton was appointed wood inspector for the city of New Bern for the year 1890, and the clerk was ordered to notify him to appear and give bond and qualify.

The Board took a recess and met at 3 p. m.

It was ordered that Thomas Daniels, treasurer, be allowed 2 1/2 per cent. commission on all moneys disbursed by him, in full compensation as treasurer of Craven county.

All officers who have not renewed their bonds will be allowed until the first Monday in January, 1890, to do so.

Otis S. Becton, wood inspector—appointed, presented his bond in the sum of \$1,000. Accepted. Said Becton qualified by subscribing to the oath of office.
