The first Democratic district of Ohio under the present apportionment gave a Democratic plurality of 22,157 votes, or an average of upward of four thousand to each district. The twelve Republican districts together gave a plurality of 19,945 votes. Knowville Tribune.

At the present time, with all the splendid equipments of our railroads, one of the greatest problems with which the railroads are confronted, is the prevention of accidents, which are still numerous and often disastrous. It looks now as if the prevention of accidents were an impossibility; but if the inventors continue to multiply as they have in the recent past, the time may come when a person will be as safe on a moving railroad as he is in his own house.—Charlotte Chronicle.
