**The Teachers' Institute—First Day.**  
The opening of this institution took place at the new Academy building on yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, with reading of the Scriptures and prayer. The roll of teachers was then called and Mr. Daniel Lane was appointed secretary. There were eighteen or twenty teachers present, which number will be largely increased today. Professor Alderman placed upon the blackboard the order of his work for the day and largely for the week. He very lucidly explained the necessary preparatory work of the teacher, showed his relation to his scholars and his duties as an instructor, and inquired into the educational and literary habits of those present. The afternoon session was an addition to and an amplification of this line of work. Each teacher is required to have pencil and tablet to take down and preserve the discussions of the Institute. This is a new application for the teachers, and will grow more interesting day by day.

Professor Alderman is an easy, graceful talker, is well up in ideas, plans and methods of the best kind, and his labors here will be helpful to all.

The sessions hereafter will be held in Miss Chadwick's room at the old building, and the entire community will be heartily welcomed if they will come.

**Location For the Electric Plant.**  
The New Berne Electric Light and Power Company purchased yesterday of Mr. Thos. S. Howard part of the large lot which fronts on South Front street and extends back to Trent river. The Company has secured the river front, a lot 55 feet wide and 250 feet deep and extending to the channel of the river. Contract for the building was immediately given out. Mr. J. A. Simpson is the contractor and he began yesterday to tear down the old saw mill house to make room for the new building. We think the Company fortunate in securing so convenient a location, and we congratulate New Berne upon this evidence of progress. New Berne is no "sleeping beauty."

The managers inform us that for the first five hundred lights taken no charge for fixtures will be made.

**An Onslow County Sailor Lost.**  
Judge A. S. Seymour has received a letter (in care of the collector of customs at New York), from the U. S. Consul at Trinidad, S. W. I., enclosing a letter from the German Consul to him (U. S. Consul) concerning a lost sailor, George Morton, of Onslow county. The letter is as follows, dated at "Kaisorlich Deutsches Konsulat, Port of Spain, Trinidad, January 8:"  
"The German bark, 'Ponlan,' arrived here from Wilmington, N. C., and her captain reports to the Consulate that on the evening of the 24th of November last, while in latitude 27.40, longitude 69.30, the article seaman, George Morton, of Onslow county, N. C., was found missing on board.  
"The said seaman had been behaving in a strange manner for some days previous, making it appear as if he was not quite sound in his mind, and it is presumed that he must have fallen or jumped overboard without anybody noticing it.  
"George Morton having been an American citizen, I now beg to forward to you his trunk and note its contents. There are no wages due him, as he drew an advance when shipping at Wilmington, N. C.

The trunk is now probably with the collector of customs at New York. Friends of the deceased may obtain it, we suppose by applying for it to the proper authorities.

**The Model School Girl.**  
School girls are generally either on one extreme or the other, and there are few things so scarce as "Model School Girls."  
Poor creatures, what hard times they must have; study from morning until night, and then often to receive so little credit! They are looked upon by some simply as "goody goodies," to whom it is perfectly natural to be good, and they therefore receive no credit for it.  
"The Model School Girl" is always in her place on time, and never goes to a class without first having perfectly prepared the lesson.  
You cannot meet her in the street every afternoon, for she has a time to go out, as well as a time to receive visitors. Should they come at a time when they will interfere with her studies, she always excuses herself.  
Talking in school is a thing unheard of! She never, never giggles, or uses slang, and yet she always seems so bright and sunny! At recess the girls all flock around her, and if they get in trouble, they always go straight to her.  
"The Model School Girl" doesn't stop in the halls for long conversations, or sit in class and poke her neighbor with slate pencils, pull her hair, etc. She is as sweet and lovable at home as at school and shows for her regular habits. She makes it a rule to have nine hours sleep, and three hours exercise. She doesn't sit up half the night to pore over lessons, and then awake in the morning as cross and dull as can be, but what she doesn't do by her regular bedtime, she finishes early in the morning, and then she goes to school looking as fresh and bright with her conquered tasks. This "Model School Girl" of ours is a thoroughly conscientious girl. If she ever does come down so far as to have a little fun in a teacher's absence, she's always sorry, and never fails to tell that it was "she." Of course she never sits in front window! Sometimes our "wonderful girl" is brilliant, and sometimes she isn't. It is said that ninety nine per cent of ambition, and one per cent of talent will conquer any task.  
"What a comfort this must be to the studious girl, who has't a great amount of brilliancy, as she toils on with this little saying ever in mind.  
Often when she recites her lesson so perfectly, it is the result of hard study, more than of natural talent. I am afraid, taken altogether, that there are not many Model School Girls in our "N. B. C. I."
