

Killed.

WASHINGTON, April 8 .- A telegram was received here today announcing the death of a son of Representative W. H. H. Cowles, of the 8th North Carolina district. The young man was at the Oxford Military School in North Carolina, and was killed by the accidental discharge of a pistol. The news was communicated to the father by Senators Ransom and Vance, and he was oversome by the shock. His outbursts of grief were pitiable. Mr. Cowles was, completely prostra-

ted, and had to be carried to the office of the clerk of the House, where he remained for more than an hour, before his friends deemed it wise to take him to his hotel. Mr. Cowles and his family left Washington for North Carolina this afternoon.

Young Cowles who accidently killed himself was 19 years old.
