A BILL has passed the Senate admitting Wyoming.

MAYOR WISSMANN has been created a Baron of the German Empire.

LUCIEN W. SPERRY, ex-Mayor of New Haven becomes an embezzler and suicide at 70.

CHOLERA has spread to France. Cases in Lyons and Marseilles cause much excitement in Paris.

THE German Reichstag has rejected all amendments to the army bill. Germany only wants a peace army.

VOUX, Randall's successor in the House, has made a very strong speech against the Federal Election bill.

THE city of Rome having offended the Government of Italy, the Government has appointed an Administrator of the affairs of the city.

THE bill to carry into effect the recommendations of the International Bank has been completed by the House Committee on Banking and Currency.

THE Republican "system of protection" is a dead, dismal failure. It was conceived as a party issue, was born an economic monstrosity. —Cleveland Plain Dealer.

WE may think we had weather in North Carolina last week but it was nothing to the intense heat in Iowa. At Burlington on Thursday the thermometer registered from 116 to 120 degrees.

MR. OREATHAM, of North Carolina, has introduced in the House a bill to aid in the establishment and temporary support of common schools. The bill is the same as the bill commonly known as the Blair bill.

THE new cruiser Philadelphia is believed to be the fastest war ship of her size in the world. In her trial trip she made nineteen knots and a half in a heavy fog and against a strong tide. Her true time is over twenty-one knots.

THE Cleveland Plain Dealer says: "The President is beginning to think that it is about time to advertise in Indianapolis for bids on painting a modest sign: 'B Harrison, LL.D., attorney and counselor at law.'"

GENERAL dissatisfaction with the census continues to prevail, and the question now is whether there has really been a fair count anywhere. Neither the system established by Superintendent Porter nor any one's observation of its operation leads to the opinion that the enumeration is reliable.

MUCH excitement exists in this country over a telegram from Havana announcing the arrest and confinement in jail of A. J. Diaz, a Baptist missionary. Diaz is an American citizen and his arrest is claimed to be religious persecution. The State Department has been appealed to in order to secure his release.

A WAR cloud has appeared in the Balkans. Russia demands the payment stipulated at the close of the Russo-Turkish war. As Turkey cannot fulfill the demand Russia will have to take satisfaction some other way, and opinion in Vienna is that the way chosen will be military.

Eastern North Carolina Colored Industrial Stock and Fruit Fair.
Posters are out announcing the first exhibition of the above named fair at New Berne, August 26 to 29, 1890. Rev. W. E. Thurber is president and W. W. Lawrence is secretary. It is stated that a large amount of premiums are offered, several good bands will be in attendance, Hon. H. P. Cheatham, Dr. J. C. Price, and other prominent speakers will be present. Cheap excursion rates on all railroads have been obtained.

The exhibition will be held on the grounds of the East Carolina Fish, Oyster, Game and Industrial Association. Governor Fowle has been invited to open the fair.

Large Increases in Population—Census Notes.
BALTIMORE.
The present population of Baltimore is estimated at 432,095, its increase during the past decade being about 100,000. This, says the Sun, will advance Baltimore from the seventh city in population to the sixth and possibly the fifth, as the figures are very close between Baltimore and St. Louis. The census places Baltimore considerably ahead of Boston.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.
The population of the District of Columbia is shown by the recent census to be 229,190, or an increase of 28.4 per cent. since 1880. There have been within these ten years, however, two enumerations made by the police, each of which showed continued increase.
The figures of 1890, although below what many expected, some of the estimates going even as high as 240,000, are yet held to be as much as any thoughtful well informed person could have anticipated.

NEW ORLEANS.
The census returns are delayed, and the enumeration will be continued during this week. The State census taken in March, as a check on the Federal ones, is nearly completed. It shows a total of about 1,147,000 for Louisiana and 236,300 for New Orleans.

ST. LOUIS.
A delegation of citizens from St. Louis have waited on Secretary Noble and Superintendent Porter to protest against the unofficial returns of the supervisor, which places the population of the city approximately at 481,000. They claim the population is over 500,000.

NEWARK.
Newark in 1880 stood fifteenth in population among the cities of the United States. The supervisor estimates the present population at 200,000.

Short-Lived Bliss.
The Rev. Sam Jones' daughter, Annie, and Prof. Wm. Graham, who eloped from Cartersville last Christmas and were married in Chattanooga by the Rev. Mr. Drumbell, rector of the St. Paul's Church, have separated. The couple went out to ride Christmas day, drove to a station above Cartersville, and took the train for Chattanooga, where they were married. They married in haste, and are now repenting at leisure. It is rumored that Prof. Graham will apply to have the marriage annulled.—Chattanooga (Tenn.) News.

Attempt to Wreck a Train.

The passenger train on the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta road, which left this city yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock, very narrowly escaped being wrecked near Winstboro. A bar of iron ten feet long was the obstruction used. One end of the bar had been driven into the ground so that the other end projected across the rail on the outside of the curve. It was in a deep cut. The engineer had no time to reverse as he was upon the obstruction almost by the time he saw it. The rail to be away the pilot and bent and twisted itself under the engine, but none of the wheels left the track. It was a very narrow escape from a terrible accident.—Charlotte News.

Connecticut's Population Decreasing.
BOSTON, June 28.—A New Haven special says there is a probability that the population of Connecticut may be shown to be not large enough to retain the State's present representation of four in Congress. The farming villages, as shown by the returns in the first district, have decreased in population during the last ten years.

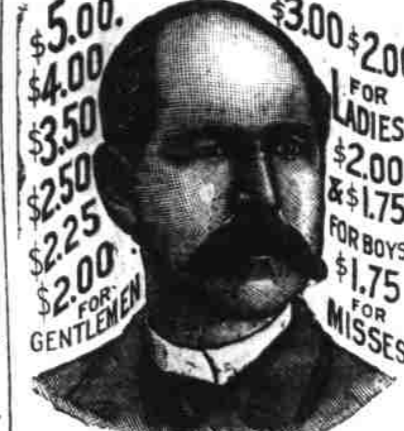
